HEALTH BOARD MAKES REPORT

Contains Detailed Information of the Work Accomplished During Fiscal Year.

Salem—Report of the State Board of Health for the biennial period ending September 30, being the third biennial report made since the organization of the board, has been received at the executive office. The report is voluminous and contains detailed information concerning the operations of the board for the year.

Typhoid fever is treated of at length, as is also tuberculosis. For the last biennial period there were 246 deaths reported from typhoid, making an estimate of 2460 cases in that time. During the same period there were 807 deaths from tuberculosis, the majority being under 50 years of age. The board strongly recommends serious consideration of these two diseases, with the end in view of supplying such measures as will reduce their prevalence to a minimum.

Stress is laid on the danger arising in harvest time in furnishing impure water to field hands, statistics showing that more than normal cases of fevers come in that season of the year.

Train Auditors to Take Tickets. Portland—A complete change in the methods of taking tickets on the Southern Pacific trains on the main line will go into effect within the next few days. The train conductor will be relieved altogether from ticketing passengers or handling any money whatever. An additional functionary will accompany each train from one terminal to another and do all such work. All the conductor of passenger trains will have to do hereafter on the main line will be to run his train.

Although at present only the Southern Pacific main line in the Pacific system is affected, it is expected the same plan will be followed on the O. R. & N. soon. The new system is followed by many railroads in the East already.

Under the new system the conductor will not touch a ticket or handle a cent of money. The train auditor will make the whole run and will report to the auditor of the road. In other words, the plan will take the ticket business out of the hands of the operating department and put it in charge of the auditing branch.

War Claim is Allowed. Salem—Attorney-General Crawford has received a dispatch from Washington saying that the United States court of claims has allowed the state of Oregon \$199,000 on account of Civil War claims arising out of expenditures made by this state in raising and maintaining volunteer troops. Out of this sum \$19,900 will be paid to Washington lawyers who assisted in the case, and the remainder will be paid into the irreducible common school fund.

The principal items in the claim which has been allowed by the government were those for bounties and for extra pay for the enlisted men. In order to get men to enlist it was found necessary to pay bounties and bonds were issued for this purpose, which were afterward paid by the state.

Ackerman Opposes Plan. Salem—Believing that the rural schools are most urgently in need of attention and strengthening at the present time, Superintendent of Public Instruction J. H. Ackerman has declined to aid in promoting legislation having for its purpose establishment of a system of inspection and uniform examinations in High Schools.

There are two movements on foot for the creation of the office of High School Inspector. One plan is that the High School Inspector shall be appointed by the State University and shall bring the High Schools of the state to such a standard of work as shall harmonize with the work of the University. The other plan is that the Inspector shall be appointed by the State Board of Education and shall bring the High Schools to such a standard as the board may deem best for the students.

State May Hire Dairy Inspectors. Portland—Creamerymen and dairymen of Oregon will join in an appeal to the legislature this winter for the appropriation of \$6000 annually for the employment of competent inspectors to educate dairymen to produce only the best possible products.

With the appropriation that will be asked, it is provided in the bill that three competent dairymen be employed and placed in the field, with nothing else to do but to spend their time with the farmers and instruct them as to the proper manner of caring for their herds, including the feeding, stabling and other details connected with the modern dairy farm.

Grange Opposes Johnson Law. Seven grange organizations were convened in a convention at Albany last Saturday in the new home of Grand Prairie Grange No. 10 of that city. Resolutions were adopted at the meeting favoring the passage by the legislature of a law allowing road districts to levy taxes same as school districts, said taxes not to exceed two mills. One of the important actions at the session of the grange was the appointing of one member from each of the various grange organizations of the county to act in the capacity of a lobby committee at the coming session of the legislature whose duty it will be to enquire into the merits of proposed bills of legislation. This convention went on record as opposed to the proposed Johnson road bill which provides for a state road engineer, also opposing appropriation of money for a state road through the Willamette valley.

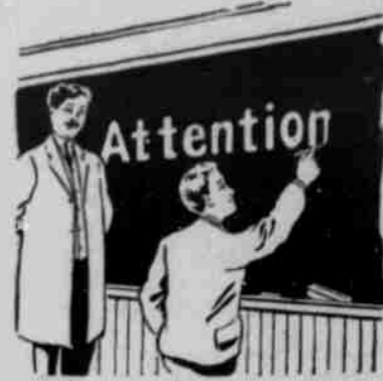
