

DOINGS IN OREGON

Interesting Items Gathered From All Parts of the State.

Deschutes Tangle Nearing an End.

Portland—Secretary Ballinger has directed that submission be made to the department for approval, if otherwise correct, of maps giving definite location of the Deschutes Railroad Company and Oregon Trunk Line Company, applicants for right of way along the banks of the Deschutes River with the understanding if at any time the government shall conclude to build a reclamation project embracing lands over which the right of way passes, it shall be at liberty to do so to the same extent as if no right of way had been asked for or granted.

In case it is decided to construct the project the railroad companies will be given an opportunity to remove their tracks, the government to be subject to no liability or expense of any kind due to removal of any tracks.

Pastor's Son Arrested.

Albany—Because Rev. W. W. Davis, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Corvallis, caused the arrest of Walter Cathcart for sending objectionable mail, his own boy, Harold Davis, is in the toils of the law.

About a year ago Cathcart began paying attention to Nita Davis, the pastor's daughter. She would have nothing to do with him and Cathcart, it is alleged, became angry and began sending her insulting letters, which she gave to her father. One was so indecent, Mr. Davis says, that he turned it over to postal officers.

Learning of this action, Cathcart informed the officers that Harold Davis had sent a postcard through the mails to another girl. This card was secured by postal officers and both boys were arrested. They were taken to Portland to answer the charge in the federal court.

Large Tract to Be Reclaimed.

LaGrande—An irrigation project of great importance to Eastern Oregon is being promoted by leading business men of this city which, if carried to completion, will bring 40,000 acres of land under irrigation. The plan is to store the waters of Meadow and McCoy creeks at a point 16 miles above La Grande by means of a dam 105 feet in height. The watershed drained represents 165 square miles and the bed of the Grand Ronde river will be used as a great irrigation canal for 16 miles. The plan contemplates the expenditure of \$500,000.

Working for New County.

Cottage Grove—People of Southern Lane and Northern Douglas counties are again asking for the creation of "Nesmith county," this time by the initiative. Men have been sent out to get names in various sections of the state and when the required number have been secured the petitions will be submitted to the secretary of state. The question will then be voted on at the general election next year.

30,000 Acres to Be Irrigated.

Eugene—Plans are perfected for bringing under irrigation the extensive valley lands between the Willamette and Lower McKenzie rivers. The tract lies just across the Willamette from Eugene and adjacent to Springfield. It comprises some 30,000 acres. The problem of securing water for this area was solved through the utilization of Clear and Fish Lakes, at the source of the McKenzie, as storage reservoirs.

Normal School Board to Meet.

Salem—Secretary C. L. Starr, of the State Board of School Regents, has sent notices to all the members of the board that a meeting of the board will be held at the capitol at 10 a. m., on May 8, for the purpose of considering the policy of the board relative to the operation of the normal schools for the school year of 1909-10.

Engine Jumps Track Into Ocean.

Astoria—As one of the engines was running on the jetty trestle, at the mouth of the river and about three miles out some unnoticed obstruction caused it to leave the tracks and topple into the ocean. All of the crew escaped injury. The engine will be raised.

Oregon Potatoes Are High.

Portland—The principal interest in produce circles is in potatoes. Shippers and speculators are scouring the country and readily paying \$1.60 per hundred at interior points. Farmers generally are ready to sell.

Roseburg to Hold Berry Festival.

Roseburg—The date of the proposed strawberry festival to be held in Roseburg has been set by the Commercial Club for Friday and Saturday, May 14 and 15. The two days will be given over to displays of strawberries.
