

# NEWS FROM THE NATION'S CAPITAL

THE NEW TARIFF BILL WILL SOON BE A LAW.

MAY TAKE EFFECT JULY 4

Army Engineers Recommend Large Appropriations for Pacific Northwest.

Washington—Chairman Payne of the ways and means committee will ask the house to agree upon a rule fixing July 1 as the date for taking a final vote on the tariff bill. It is asserted by house leaders that they have received enough pledges from the members from Atlantic and other states, Democrats as well as Republicans, to insure its passage.

This means that the senate and house leaders have agreed that the bill will be ready for final passage by that date. If no slip occurs thereafter the new tariff law will be on the statutes by July 4, providing always that the bill meets with the approval of President Taft.

Secretary Knox has notified all the governments with which the United States has commercial agreements under section 3 of the Dingley tariff law, of the intention of this government to abrogate these agreements. Manifestly Secretary Knox assumes, first, that the Dingley provision for commercial treaties is to be suspended, and second, that it is to be displaced in the near future with a new provision of law which will do away such agreements—that is, the maximum and minimum clause of the tariff law.

The army engineers have recommended that an appropriation of \$1,550,000 be incorporated in the next river and harbor bill to complete the jetty at the mouth of the Columbia river. It is their belief that this amount will enable them to finish the south jetty. In addition to this they ask for \$1,000,000 for the Cello canal and recommend a continuing project carrying \$2,600,000, which will complete the waterway.

Other appropriations recommended are: Columbia, below mouth of Willamette, \$175,000; Columbia, at Cascades, \$105,000; Columbia, above Cello, \$90,000; Upper Columbia, between Bridgeport and Wenatchee, \$25,000; Snake river, \$15,000; Puget Sound and tributaries, \$120,000; Grays Harbor, \$15,000.

If the income tax amendment to the tariff bill ever comes to a vote in the senate, it will stand a reasonable chance of adoption. This fact is known both to the friends and enemies of the amendment, and from this time on the efforts of Aldrich, the chief objector to an income tax, will be bent in the direction of preventing a vote on either the Cummins or the Bailey amendment. He will endeavor to prevent this by the exercise of shrewd parliamentary tactics or by resort to some subterfuge which will win over the votes of a few senators who at heart are not favorable to an income tax, but would be compelled to vote for it if the issue should be squarely raised.

Sultan Mehmed V. of Turkey, has cabled a message in acknowledgment of the greetings sent to him by President Taft on his ascension to the throne. Ambassador Leishman, at Constantinople, cabled that the government had taken energetic means to suppress further attempts at disorders and to punish perpetrators of the recent trouble. The government, he said, appeared to be able and anxious to restore peace.

Senator Jones, of Washington, has been advised by the Indian office that Special Agent Roblin, who recently was detailed to obtain the consent of the Yakima Indians to sell a part of their allotments, reports that he found a very strong feeling of opposition to the plan, especially among the older and more influential Indians, many of them being under the impression that the government proposed to deprive them of their land without adequate compensation.

It is the belief of the Indian office that, with the foundation he is laying, Agent Roblin will be able to overcome the opposition of the Indians to a great extent, and in time obtain the desired contracts from a sufficient number of them to insure the success of the project.

Secretary of the Navy Meyer states that the 16 battleships of the Atlantic fleet, which had made the voyage around the world, were in excellent condition, due to the fact that they were accompanied by a repair ship throughout the trip. The secretary said he found that the voyage had cost \$1,500,000 more than if the battleships had been kept at home.
