ings located in the public streets of Independence. The council about two years ago were asked to have these buildings removed from the streets, the council instructed the city attorney to give thirty days notice for the removal thereof and if not moved to commence an action. Before the time expired the parties notified the attorney that they would not remove the buildings and the council then instructed the attorney to drop the matter.

The city of Independence has a contract with the Willamette Valley Company for five years. The contract was drawn by Oscar Hayter and appears to be good and sufficient contract and is backed up by ordinance. The contract provides that the Willamette Valley Company shall furnish water to the city upon certain conditions, among other things it provides that the said company shall upon proper notice from the city put in certain hydrants whenever and wherever the council shall designate. The citizens and taxpayers of Oldtown petitioned for two hydrants to be put in for fire protection. The council gave the company due and legal notice according to ordinance, and the company refused to put in the hydrants and still refuse to do so and the council refuse to take any action in the matter. I might mention other instances but the records of the recorder's office are open to the public. This condition of affairs is probably the reason that the Krebs Hop Company takes the ordinance of Independence as a joke.

Threshermen's Convention

Bascom B. Clarke, editor of the "American Thresherman", the leading paper of its kind in the United States; Lee Hardin of Indianapolis, Indiana, representing one of the largest of American manufacturers; and Morris O. Eldredge of the United States Department of Agriculture unite in the statement that the Oregon Threshermen held a most successful convention of its kind ever gathered together in this country, and that the entertainment at Portland was

superior to that ever given in any other city. These gentlemen were invited out to show Oregon how they themselves were shown. All agree in giving chief credit for this success to Secretary Phillip S. Bates of the Oregon Threshermen.

The battle over the lead schedule of the tariff bill still continues in the senate and the issue is more clearly drawn between the Republican leaders and the Republican insurgents. The latter openly threaten to keep congress in session all summer rather than allow the schedules to be rushed through, and have warned the leaders that an unsatisfactory bill meant only a renewal of the battle for revision two years hence.

Republican members of the senate finance committee were visited by a delegation of 60 hat manufacturers and wholesale dealers representing 24 different states. The hat manufacturers were given an increase over the Dingley rates in the house bill, but the duties were scaled down by the senate finance committee to about 25 per cent below the Dingley rate. The manufacturers assert that many of them will be driven out of business if these rates are adopted.

Large areas of valuable farming land in one of the most beautiful valleys in the West will be opened to settlers on May 22. The lands are situated in the Shoshone irrigation project, which eventually will reclaim 150,000 acres east of the Yellowstone National Park in Northern Wyoming. The farms are to be offered for settlement under the homestead law, subject to the payment of actual cost of applying water to the land, which has been fixed at \$46 per acre, payable in not more than ten annual installments with no interest.

Postmasters hereafter will be held strictly to account if they deliver in person packages of foreign origin containing dutiable articles without first submitting them to the nearest custom officers or without collecting the duty assessed upon each package, as the result of an order issued by the postoffice department.

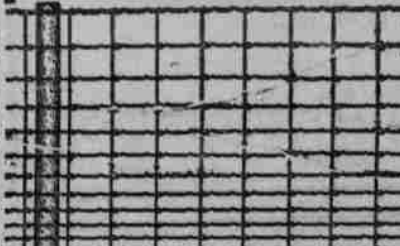
