RUSHING WORK ON OREGON

Historic Battleship Will Soon Be Placed in Commission. Bremerton, Wash., May 11—A force of nearly 200 men is now engaged in repairing the old battleship Oregon, and word has been received to place that ship in commission without delay. The repairs on the ship will cost at least \$1,000,000. Several years ago she was dismantled and has lain in this harbor ever since. All of her guns, except the main battery of four 13-inch guns, have been placed ashore and the interior of the ship has been practically gutted. In being refitted, the guns will have new mounts and sights. The latest system of fire control is to be installed. When recommissioned, the Oregon will still be a powerful fighting unit of the American navy.
