Crigleigh, F. Heavener, The Con-  
cilor and W. W. Percival, St. Salva-  
nia. There was some delay in get-  
ting started and when they did get  
off McLaughlin's two horses were  
left at the post, failing to get off  
when the word was given. Crigleigh  
passed under the wire first with St.  
Salvania a close second and Council  
or third.

Just after the horses got off Leslie  
Gibbreath rushed up to the starter,  
A. C. Lohmire, accusing him of giv-  
ing his horses the worst of the start,  
and struck him behind the left ear  
with a whip he used to start Kam-  
sack. Bystanders interfered quelling  
the disorder. After the race was over  
and before the judges had given their  
decision, McLaughlin filed a protest,  
claiming that Lohmire had shown par-  
tiality in starting the race. The  
judges, after hearing both sides of the  
controversy, refused to sustain the  
protest.

In the mile dash for \$150 there was  
only three starters, Kamsack and  
Crigleigh being scratched. Pacific  
won the race in 1:47, Lesh being a  
close second and King Koro third. It  
was a pretty race and it looked for a  
time that King Koro was going to  
win, having taken the lead from the  
start and maintaining it until the  
home stretch when he was passed  
by Pacific and Lesh, the three horses  
coming under the wire in a bunch.

The last race of the meet was a  
match race of an eighth of a mile,  
between Her Farwell, owned by G.  
E. Brown of Corvallis and Axlehead,  
owned by W. W. Cardwell of Rose-  
burg, for \$250 a side. The race was  
won easily by the latter horse in 11  
seconds.

The foot race of 100 yards for a  
purse of \$100 a side, between I. S.  
Goodman of Roseburg and a Forest  
Grove man was won by the latter  
with hands down. Considerable mon-  
ey changed hands over this race, as  
the Roseburg people thought they had  
a record breaker.

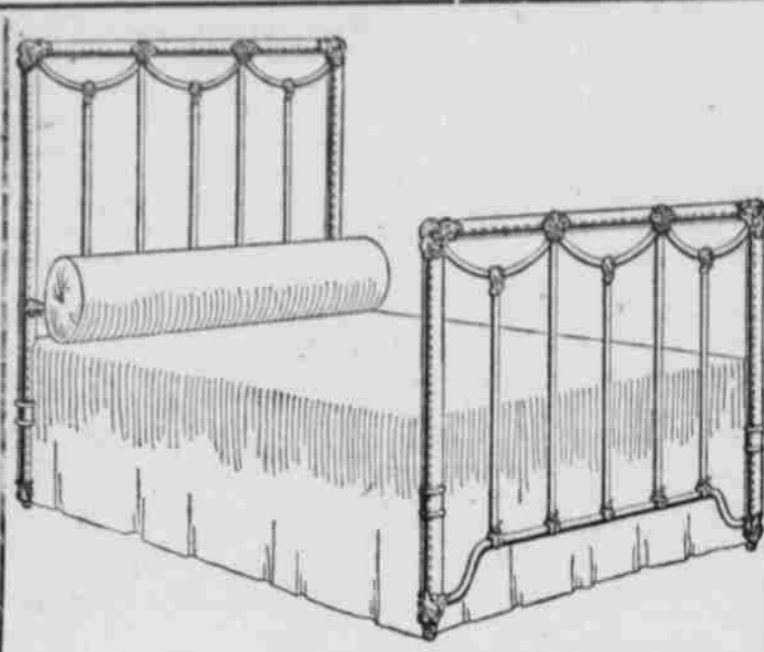
