Notice of Sale of Bonds.

Notice is hereby given that at a regular meeting of the common council of the city of Independence, Oregon, to be held in the council chamber in said city on the 21st day of July, 1909, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock p. m., the said city will sell 50 negotiable coupon sewer bonds of said city, of the principal amount of \$12,500 in the aggregate, as authorized by ordinance No. 104 of said city, entitled "An ordinance authorizing the issuance and sale of bonds of the city of Independence, Oregon, for the purpose of raising funds for the construction of a system of sewers in said city," passed over the mayor's veto June 2, 1909, said bonds are in denominations of \$250 each, payable twenty years from the first day of August, 1909, (with the privilege, optional with said city, of paying said bonds or any part thereof at any time after the first day of August, 1914,) and bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually from August, 1909, until paid, principal and interest payable at the First National Bank of Portland, Oregon, in gold coin, without cost, charge or expense to the purchaser or holder of said bonds. Said bonds will be sold to the highest bidder or bidders therefor, but will not be sold for less than their face value. The said council reserves the right to accept bids for any part of said issue of bonds hereby advertised to be sold, if bids for a part only of such bonds be received, and also reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
