RAILROADS ENGAGE

TRAINS WILL MAKE PAST TIME TO COAST.

MAIL CONTRACTS INVOLVED

Fight Inaugurated by Hill Lines. in Order to Forestall the St. Paul Road.

Chicago, Sept. 6 .- When the Hill lines announced a few days ago that they would lop ten hours off the fastest time between Chicago and the North Pacific Coast points they inaugurated a speed war that has spread over the entire transcontinental railway map. In the Southwest territory, the fight is on for the mail contract. The Santa Fe proposes to out ten hours off its time between Kansas City and Los Angeles and its rivals are scurrying in every direction and ordering their experts 35c; ranch, 26 @ 27c. to get equipment in condition and be ready to meet the time of the Santa

The fight started when the Hill lines apparently sought to forestall the St. Paul road, which, with its Puget Sound extension, will soon be in position to make trouble in regard to rates and mall contracts.
