There is no question any longer but that the freight rate reduction on wheat recently ordered to be made by the Northern Pacific is to affect the growers of grain in Eastern Oregon. The O. R. & N. has made the announcement that it will meet the Northern Pacific in the territory affected by the order of the railroad commission and the reduction for Oregon wheat must soon follow, possibly by November 1, the time the new rate is scheduled to go into effect.

According to Roland Hinton Perry, the well-known sculptor, who was recently released from Ludlow street jail in Brooklyn after serving a six-months' term for contempt of court in refusing to pay alimony to his wife, if he had not been in jail he would not have accomplished a great many things he has wanted to do for a long time. Grant of Dallas received a letter last week, informing him that he had been unanimously elected president of the National Mohair Growers' Association held in Silver City, New Mexico, on the 23 of September last, and that James Riddell of Monmouth had also been honored by a place on the executive board. The news came as a pleasant surprise to both gentlemen as neither of them had courted honors at the hand of the association, and came, also, as a worthy recognition of their standing as national breeders.
