The plaintiffs, a New York post card house, sued to recover \$48 from the Independence firm. It appears from the evidence that Craven & Moore had bought the cards through M. J. Wax Co., Portland agents of the plaintiff, and paid the amount of the bill to that con-

cern. It appears further, however, that Newfield & Newfield have a rule strictly forbidding the payment of any accounts to their agents. The jury after brief deliberation brought in a verdict for the plaintiffs for the amount sued for, and it looks as if Craven & Moore will be \$48 out of pocket unless they shall succeed in recovering the amount from the Portland agency.
