The annual summer session of the University of Oregon will be held this coming summer from June 29 to August 10, inclusive, a six weeks' term. The attendance during last summer reached nearly 100, most of whom were Oregon teachers, and indications point to a much larger attendance for next summer.

At the teachers' annual institute for Polk county, which takes place at Dallas, December 8, 9 and 10, a number of the leading educators of the state are to be present. Among this number are Superintendent of Public Instruction J. H. Ackerman, President W. J. Kerr of Oregon Agricultural College, Superintendent of Schools of Multnomah County R. F. Robinson, Ex-President of Monmouth Normal E. D. Ressler, L. R. Alderman of University of Oregon, J. M. Powers, superintendent of schools of Salem, and others. Superintendent Seymour expects to make this one of the best institutes in recent years.

W. M. Foster and Leonard Loundow who recently came to Oregon from Montana and bought a large tract of fine land near Independence, were in town Saturday. They are enthusiastic in their belief that there is a great future in Polk county for commercial orchards and are planning the establishment of one of the largest groves in the county. Ground is being prepared for the planting of 150 acres to fruit this spring. They are men who will be satisfied only with the best the country will produce and are, therefore, the most desirable citizens a country can have.

Walter Domea, the enterprising young Jersey breeder at McCoy, Oregon, has the distinction of having the world's record official high testing cow of any age in Landseer's Pacific Pearl, her average for the year being 7 1-10. She is also world's record cow between three and three and a half years old, as a butter producer. She began at three years and one month and was milked eleven months giving 8930 pounds of milk and 751 pounds of butter. To make the record more remarkable she carried a calf during eight months of her lactation. She was sired by Landseer N. Exle, dam Pacific Pearl, that has a seven days' record of eighteen pounds seven ounces. Walter reports his Hampshire hogs all right. He sold some on the fair circuit and has sold several Jerseys since the fair.
