Mr. Fishback was born in Rappahannock county, Virginia, June 4, 1830. He came to Oregon in 1868, first locating in Dallas, Polk county. He was a good mechanic, an honest man and an esteemed citizen of Polk county, having resided here for over forty years. At one time he worked on the National Capital building in Washington, D. C., and this was always a source of pride to him as he considered it an honor to have worked on the great structure. He also worked on the first wing of the old Christian College at Monmouth, and built the first South Methodist church of Dallas which is now known as the Adventist church.
