post their money on him, know what he can do.

Special trains are expected to be run over the Southern Pacific from Forest Grove, from which quarter large sums of money are reaching here to back Duganne, and Falls City has guaranteed Mr. Hirschberg an attendance of 200 for a special from that city. It is from this quarter that most of the money is coming which is being posted on young Evans.

Both men are in daily training for the event which is to take place December 27. Duganne will tip the beam at 153 when he enters the ring while his opponent will enter at 147 pounds.

Special arrangements are being made by Oviatt Bros. for the ten-round bout. A stage will be erected in the middle of the auditorium and will be circled by flights of elevated seats. The rope which will circle the stage has been secured from the Smithsonian Institute and is the one which was in use during the famous fight of Jack Kilrain and John L. Sullivan.

Efforts are being made by the city and county authorities to prevent the fight taking place in Independence, but it is learned that the city charter is so constructed (an opinion having been handed down by Attorney General Crawford) that officials are rendered powerless to prevent an occurrence of the event as scheduled. Anticipating riot following the fight at the auditorium Sheriff Grant will be in constant touch with Governor Benson and it is believed the state militia may be called out to preserve order. Capt. Abrams of Salem is holding a company of Oregon National Guards in readiness for immediate service.

Among distinguished visitors of the sporting world who will be present are Jack Dempsey, who will referee the fight, and Billy Woods, sporting editor of the Police Gazette.
