

INDEPENDENCE WINS BIG GAME

The Independence foot ball team journeyed to Newport last Saturday to play their last game of the season with the team of that city. In a game between these two teams earlier in season Newport was defeated by a decisive score and they expected to get revenge in this last game of the season. They had prepared for the game by taking in the best players from Siletz, Yaquina and Newport. They also had four old eastern college players from a gang of Southern Pacific surveyors, but our boys were there with the goods as usual. After a few minutes of playing it was demonstrated that Newport intended to win at any cost.

Star Play by Pomeroy

One of the most spectacular plays of the day was made by Capt. Pomeroy. Newport punted to Pomeroy and Byers, but Ellison recovered the punt and had a clear field for a touch-down. He tore down the field, cheered on by hundreds of Newport throats when suddenly out into the clear sprang Captain Pomeroy and, clipping off a 440 gait, started after the eastern star half-back and brought him down a few feet from the goal line.

Newport then sent her heavy back-field against the Independence line, endeavoring to get the ball the few remaining feet for a touchdown, but failed to make yardage in the three downs. The Independence line was impregnable. The ball should then have gone to Independence when it would have been put out of danger, but the umpire gave it to Newport on the first down. Again Independence held and finally secured the ball after four more downs. A punt followed when time was called. Score, 0 to 0.

In the second half Newport kicked off and followed in a series of terrific line plunges and end runs for from three to twenty yards by Emerick, Pomeroy and Williams. Jess Emerick was sent over for the first touch-down. Pomeroy kicked goal. Score, Independence 6; Newport, 0.

Independence kicked off but Newport failed to make yardage and Independence took the ball and started a steady march down the field for another touchdown, but failed to make yardage on the five yard line. Newport punted but Independence broke through and blocked and Emerick fell on the ball. Independence was declared off side and penalized 5 yards and lost the ball. Cronise punted to Emerick and Independence started down the field for another touchdown. Newport was unable to stop the advance of Independence and the ball was carried over for the second touchdown. Pomeroy failed to kick goal. Score, Independence 11; Newport 0.

In the latter part of the first half Captain Sparks was rendered unconscious in tackling Williams and was carried from the field.


