

BUILD MODERN HIGH SCHOOL

The school board has shown much activity during the past week in the proposal to build a high school building here. The committee which was appointed to act in conjunction with the school board in this matter, in looking after options suitable for a site for the building and to make estimates of the probable costs of the building, have also been active. The committee consists of W. L. Bice, Word Butler and J. L. Hanna.

The most promising option suitable for a location for the building was secured from the Hill interest in the southern part of the city and consists of about eight and a half acres. The property is within the city limits, being in the Hill ball park and out from Sixth street. There are eighteen lots in this property and the price named in the option is \$75 a lot.

The school board, accompanied by the special committee, visited Junction City last week to go over the plans of the model high school building of that city and inspect it with a view of copying the building for Independence after it. The cost of the Junction City building was between \$6000 and \$7000. There are eight rooms in the building, six for classes and two for laboratories. It is considered to be one of the most model and up-to-date high school buildings in the country. The board and committee were not satisfied with inspecting the institution but hunted up the architect in that city and secured the plans and blue prints for the building. The architect assured them that at a cost of \$400 or \$500 the building could be enlarged, with additions of ten feet on either side. The heating plants of the Junction City high school and grammar school were installed at a cost of \$1500, and include individual plants for both institutions. \$1500 was contract price of the plants but the architect informed the committee that on completion of the heating system the cost of the plants attained to the sum of about \$1800.

On their return to Independence the board set about to immediately prepare and circulate a petition asking for a submission of the proposal to the voters of the district the proposition of bonding the district for the sum of \$15,000, this sum to be used in the securing of suitable grounds for a site and for the cost of erecting the high school building. As is shown in the report of the committee and board who inspected the Junction City institution the amount necessary for the construction of the building will not be anywhere near the amount named in the petition, but it has been urged by many citizens of Independence that the bond be made plenty large that there will be ample funds to carry out the plans which will be adopted. Only enough bonds will be sold to defray the actual expenses of purchasing a site and constructing the building and installing the heating plant. The actual amount is estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$10,000. Twenty days' notice is required for the posting of the notice, calling for a special election for the voters of a district of the second class. The date of the

election is set for about March 1.

OPINION IS HANDED DOWN

The decision of J. H. Ackerman in the matter of the election of H. C. Dunsmore as director of school district No. 29: (1) No person shall be eligible to a public office who shall not be at the time of his election a legal voter for a school officer in such district; (2) that in any district of the second class, a voter at a school meeting must hold property in such district as shown by the last court has decided that the name of the person who wishes to vote must appear on the assessment roll or that he must have stocks, shares or ownerships in a corporation or co-partnership and the corporation or co-partnership must appear on the last assessment roll. Signed by J. H. Ackerman and concurred in by Attorney-General Crawford.
