"J. M. Vanduyn, a prominent merchant of Ferrell, Idaho, and a brother of I. Vanduyn of Portland, died last Thursday at his home.

"Mr. Vanduyn was born April 21, 1855, in Coburg, Or. About eight years ago he moved to San Francisco, but has lived for the past six years in Ferrell, Idaho. Cement Roads of France.

Ferro cement roads are being experimented with in France. The substance is made of cement mixed with straw. To make a slab or block of ferro cement a mass of iron straw is placed in the mold, and there is poured over it cement sufficiently fluid to penetrate into all the interstices of the iron and completely cover it. When the whole has set, the core of iron thus intimately incorporated gives to the block a great resistance to breakage and to traction, at the same time furnishing elasticity to compression which enables it to stand superficial shocks. A brick of ferro cement one and three-fifths inches thick has supported during crushing tests a pressure of about sixty-five tons to the square inch. In breakage tests the resistance was quadruple that of ordinary cement. Resistance to wear was no less remarkable.

SHOWS OFF AUTO

A. V. Clay, manager of the Capital Automobile Co. of Salem, was in Independence last Saturday demonstrating the Chalmers-Detroit automobile. Local people who accompanied him on demonstration trips out into the country were astonished with the demonstration of the energy and endurance of his machine. Mr. Clay was driving a two cylinder 30 horse power car. He made many severe tests of his machine which showed the all-around superiority of the machine.

Accompanying him on an energy test through the mud on the hill west of Monmouth were Messrs. Chas. E. Hicks and Wm. Dawes of this city and J. B. V. Butler and Ira C. Powell of Monmouth and Conrad Krebs of Salem. The machine climbed up the hill from the north approach with ease through four inches or more of mud. On the opposite side the descent was more precipitous and mud attained a depth of at least ten inches. It did not seem possible that the machine would be able to return through the mud and ascend the hill. That Mr. Clay was able to put his machine to the top of the hill was regarded by his guests as little short of marvelous.

His demonstration was made here in petting rain, and mud and slush was on every hand. It is thought that he has made several friends here and at Monmouth for his machine.
