SCHOOL PLANS ARE ACCEPTED

Plans for the high school building which is to be erected in this city

have been prepared and accepted. They were drawn by E. C. McLaren, an architect, in competition with several other Portland firms all of which submitted drawings for the school building.

The plans for the building as accepted provide for a building 87x67 feet to be two stories high and to be built at a cost of approximately \$20,000. It is to be of reinforced concrete with fireproof roof. Work on the construction is expected to begin at once and completion of the building made early enough for the fall term of school.

In the full concrete basement will be located the lavatories, the manual training rooms, domestic science rooms, girls' and boys' lounging rooms, laboratories for chemistry, physics, etc., and the heating plant.

On the first floor will be class rooms and the principal's office. This office will be equipped with a large open fire-place. On the second floor will be a large study hall to be used for assembly purposes, class rooms and rooms for the various teachers. The lighting and ventilation of the building will be such as is found in the best of modern school houses.

The school building is to be located

in an eight-acre tract which has recently been purchased by the school board. This tract will be fitted up for an athletic park and campus ground for the students. The building to be built at this time is the only structure now proposed. It will be of the Mission Doric type of architecture and will present a handsome appearance.
