FINE JERSEYS BROUGHT HERE

Among the Jersey breeders who attended the great Jersey sale of the Harry West herd of Scappoose, Oregon, were most of the leading herdsmen of the county. Among buyers were Harry Hiff, who brought home two head of cows; John Stump and son of Monmouth bought four head; Walter Domes of McCoy also bought four head, his premium buy costing him \$719; Wm. Morrow of Rickreall bought two head; Frank Laughary brought home a fine bull calf for which he paid \$175; G. G. Hewitt also bought a bull calf for which he paid \$139, and Frank Linn of Perrydale came home with one of the better animals of the sale. There were in all seventeen head brought back to Polk county, eight of which were unloaded at Independence. A. Nelson, who also attended the sale, says that it was without doubt the greatest sale of thoroughbred cattle ever held in the west, if not in the United States, the average selling price of the herd of between seventy and eighty head being \$227. This price takes into account the little calves which were carried into the auction ring. "It is intended to show something of the mark of enthusiasm which is taking hold of the breeders of our county," said Mr. Nelson. The total sales of the West herd amounted to \$16,850. The premium seller brought \$1000. Mr. Stump of Monmouth paid \$400 for his best buy.

It is said that at this sale was represented the best Jersey blood of the world today, many of the animals being Island bred. The bull calf brought to his farm near Monmouth, is out of an Island bred bull which was imported at a cost of \$1000.

Death of Mrs. Watson

Mrs. Rachel Watson, an old and highly respected resident of Independence, died at her home in this city on April 28, 1910, at the age of seventy years, eleven months and seven days.

Miss Rachel Wheeler was born May 21, 1839, at Smithfield, Illinois. She was married to John D. Watson in 1857. In 1881 she and her husband removed to Oregon where she has since resided, having lived in Independence for the past fifteen years or longer. Mr. Watson died at this place five years ago.

Mrs. Watson was the mother of six children, only one of whom is now living, Mrs. C. N. Sharp of this place.

Funeral services were held at Calvary Presbyterian church at 2 p. m. last Sunday, Dr. Dunsmore officiating. All of Mrs. Watson's grandchildren were present at the funeral. Interment was made in I. O. O. F. cemetery.
