### Hill Gets Glad Hand

Central Oregon has lived an eventful life the past two weeks, first with a series of development meetings planned by the commercial organizations at Bend, Prineville, Burns, Prairie City and Enterprise, and then in entertaining Louis W. Hill and his party who made a leisurely trip

through the region in automobiles, and everywhere received welcomes that would put to shame the conventional receptions of the large cities.

The most interesting feature of all was the award of contract for a mammoth bridge over the Columbia a Cello falls for the Oregon Trunk. The cost will be approximately \$1,500,000, there will be twenty-nine spans to the structure and it must be completed by January 1, 1912. The total length is 3960 feet, or more than three-quarters of a mile. The longest span is 350 feet.
