TIMBER RESOURCES

Oregon has three hundred and fifty billion feet of standing timber, even now worth four hundred and seventy-five million dollars. If manufactured and sold at present prices it would bring \$5,000,000,000 into the state for labor and supplies. Oregon sells \$20,000,000 worth of lumber a year. Of this amount \$14,000,000 is received by employees which amount is put into local circulation in the state. The timber belts of Oregon pay a large portion of the state's taxes.

The forests of Oregon comprise one sixth of the standing timber of the United States.

OBITUARY OF A. W. STANSBERRY

Allen W. Stansberry was born March 7, 1842, in Scott county, Indiana. At the age of eleven, he, with his parents, moved to Libertyville, Jefferson county, Iowa.

In August, 1861, he enlisted in company H, Third Iowa Cavalry, at Birmingham, Van Buren county, Iowa, serving throughout the rebellion. He was wounded at Little Rock, Arkansas, and lay in the hospital for three months, when he re-enlisted as a veteran for three years in the same company, being mustered out August 9, 1865.

He was married to Mary Emily Wright, daughter of Freeman Wright of Batavia, Jefferson county, Iowa, September 28, 1865, to whom six children were born, four being at his bedside through his last illness. With his family he immigrated, by the way of San Francisco, to Portland, Oregon, in the spring of 1871, residing near there until February, 1880, when they moved to Echo, Umatilla county, Oregon. There they resided on a farm until 1894, when they crossed the mountains to Independence where he resided until his death, May 12, 1910.

He lived a devoted Christian life, as the light was revealed to him. MARY E. STANSBERRY.
