## NOTED BREEDER PAYS A VISIT

Harry West of Scappoose was in the city a couple of days this week visiting at the homes of Messrs. Nelson and Stump. Mr. West came here to inspect the fine Jerseys which these gentlemen have just received direct from Jersey Island. "I have traveled around considerable over the United States during the last month and what I have seen of the Jerseys at the farm of these two gentlemen are equal if not superior to anything I have ever seen anywhere in the country. While in the east I attended the Walker sale in Rushville, Indiana, of imported Jerseys. At this sale there was one bull sold for \$900 and the herd averaged \$912 a head. I also attended the T. S. Cooper sale of imported Jerseys at Coopersburg, Pennsylvania, where one bull sold for \$1110 and the sale averaged \$629 each. I believe these heifers which Messrs. Nelson and Stump have just received are equal to anything at these sales.

"You have a good country. I have been here several times before and it looks good to me. I have been all over the east and there is no country in all my travels that I would trade Oregon for.

"While in the east I bought thirty-two head of Jerseys which I now have on my farm at Scappoose. Quite a number of these are imported while others are from imported sires and dams."
