with the reins of government. We need men educated to be citizens and citizens educated to be men. Not mere animals, not machines, but men. Men who dare, men who do, men who know their rights and maintain them; men who know the rights of others and dare to grant them. "The age wants men who can front the stars with their manhood's gaze undaunted, and keep white lives from the evil scars the world's vile code has granted. Bold men of brain, in whose veins the blood runs warm with a hero's yearning, like the martyred sires who unblinking stood, all the tyrant's thunder spurning." "When has there been an age like this? When has there been an age that called so loudly and beseechingly for noble men and noble deeds? For mighty brains to take and solve perplexing problems; mighty hearts to dare and do; and mighty souls—broad, generous, forceful—to instruct and lift and lead! From every path that man has blazed into the wild; from every highway where the feet of thousands press; from every mart the cry goes up—an earnest call for earnest men! The world today has needs it never knew before. For it has passed the shadow; passed the travail of the ancient void; passed from the grip of primal things; passed into light; and taken there its first full goblet from the sun! That draft has stirred the very rocks upon the hills; has turned to power the wasteful waters; has instilled a purpose in the truant winds. The air is pregnant with great news; great news of glories yet to be, when we have answered to the age, when we have awakened to the light!

"Strong men and true, great men and good, brave men and wise in simple faith; men warm with love and rich with hope; men with high aims and lowly hearts. The Age is calling out for these—crying along the crowded streets, crying along the quiet lanes. bulls which, with the two imported males, give them quite a start in the bull line.

Iberan Marquis, the herd bull, was dropped December 26, 1908. He is a solid color with black tongue and switch. His band number is 4429 (Marquis Jim C), and was bred by J. P. Romeril of St. Peters. The other is Croydon (P S 4424 H C) bred by J. W. Maillet of St. Lawrence; solid color, black tongue and switch, and was dropped March 24, 1909. In the herd is a number of the Oakland family, which has made the C. I. Hood herd famous.

While in the east Mr. Nelson visited several of the big dairy farms, among them being the C. I. Hood farm. He says that they have in his opinion not many advantages over the western man. Labor does not give them the bother it does here. This was his first trip east, and while he enjoyed it greatly, he was glad to get back to the old Willamette.

Since arriving, the herd has received large numbers of visitors, among them Saturday being J. W. Bailey, State Dairy and Food Commissioner. He was most favorably impressed.

The herd is owned jointly by Ross Nelson and J. W. Stump of Monmouth, the two sharing expenses and dividing the herd equally.

Mr. Stump is too well known to need an introduction through these columns. He has had full-blooded Jerseys for a number of years, and with this importation he will be placed along with Mr. Nelson in the front ranks among the Pacific coast breeders.

This is not only the first time that this herd will be heard from.

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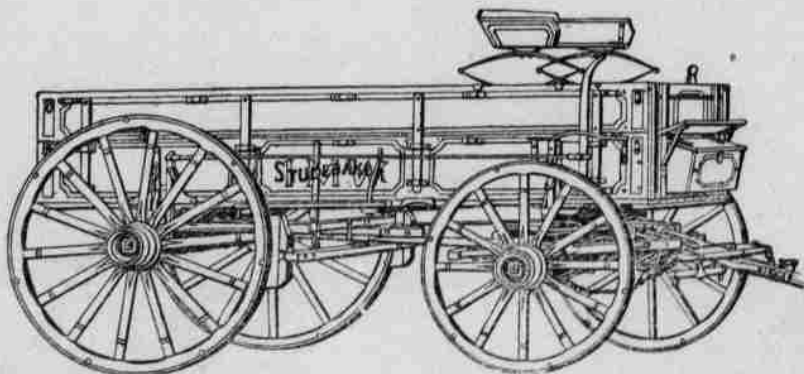
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
