by any means as where sown alone. The Jersey Center Stock Farm, with J. W. Flinn, proprietor, near McCoy, is one just being heard from. Mr. Flinn is a bright young man with an agricultural college education, on a good farm, and has a wonderfully nice start of young Jersey cattle. He purchased three heifers at the Atkinson sale, sired by Golden Borelio, and are rich in the Golden Lad blood. At the West sale he purchased Tormentor's Sirona, a beautiful heifer and a double granddaughter of the great imported bull, Tormentor, that has sixty-five tested daughters. He also has a heifer from the Domes' ranch, a daughter of the world's champion two-year-old. He is expecting to build a new barn to accommodate his fine stock, and from now on will be known as one of our breeders. He has recently added to his farm five fine Lincoln ewes from the Hawley flock.

The Jersey business is certainly getting a strong hold in the Willamette valley as new breeders are springing up. Another new breeder, that will be heard from soon, is M. H. Jones, near Perrydale. He has several pure-bred Jersey cows, and seven of them turned over \$100 in a cream check for the month of May. W. H. McKee is another man near Perrydale that is of the progressive sort and does not believe in falling into the same rut that our forefathers made fifty years ago. When I was at his place he was harvesting a good crop of alfalfa hay that would go, perhaps, two tons to the acre, and was of fine quality. He has a fifteen-acre field of this and is milking a number of cows. In May thirteen cows returned him \$154.50 besides supplying cream and butter for the family. He has a good barn and is just putting in a cement floor and gutter for his cows.

On down near Whiteson is W. A. Forrest who is also getting a start in the Jersey business, and now has eleven registered Jersey heifers. Henry Kelt, the well-known Cotswold sheep breeder, nearly closed his stock out last fall. He kept only a few yearlings, but he will be heard from along this line by another year at least. He is busy building a fine, large modern farm house on his place near Perrydale.

At the big booster meeting held at Dallas recently there was one speaker who recited among the needs of that live town several industries for which there seemed to be a demand. Among them was the statement that judging from the blind pig traffic, Dallas needed a brewery or a suit case factory. The men who have thronged the bottling works at the big Salem brewery the last two days, getting their suit cases filled with bottled beer to pack off into dry counties south and west of Salem looked solemn and guilty but they numbered hundreds.

Many drayloads were shipped by express to Albany, Corvallis and Harrisburg. Boxes, barrels, and kegs, half-barrels, and cases—all containing straight Salem brewery products went out to dealers and private parties, all determined to have something wet in connection with the Fourth of July celebrations. The day of liberty and freedom when the eagle screams and the British are once more routed from the battle fields of the revolution is not to go off without parched throats being refreshed with something besides river water more or less polluted with sewage.

The big Salem brewery reaps a golden harvest from the business of the dry counties as it is all cash trade and they get their own prices. The consumption is quick and there are no kicks about the quality, although it is identically the same for the dry counties as the wets. So goes the merry battle over booze and sales increase in the territory dedicated to prohibition.—Salem Journal.

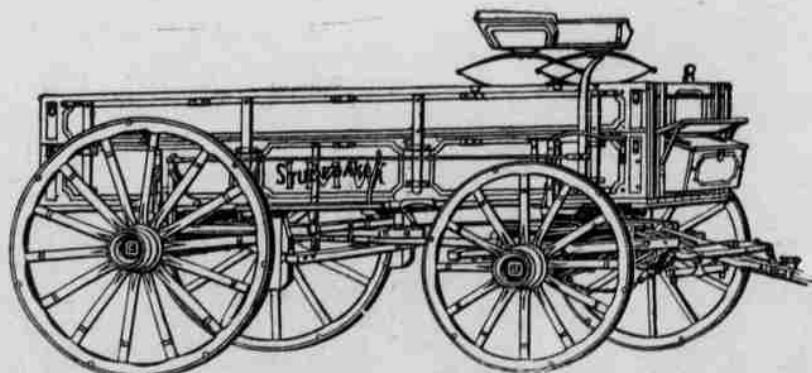
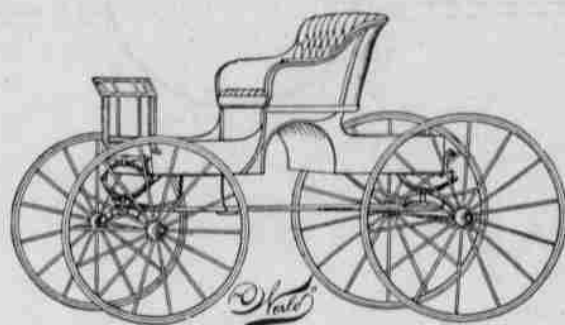
