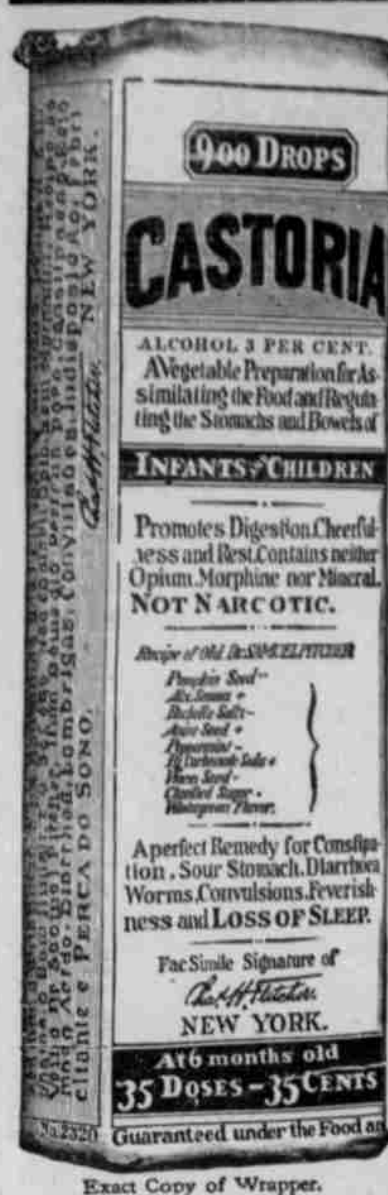

JUDGE BUTLER WILL NOT RUN

R. R. Butler, circuit judge of the eleventh district, has announced that he will not be a candidate to succeed himself. The eleventh judicial district embraces Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties.

Judge Butler was appointed two years ago to succeed E. V. Littlefield, who resigned. At the recent state assembly, Judge Butler received the unanimous indorsement of the delegations from the counties of which his district is composed. D. R. Parker of Condon and W. C. Bryant of Sherman county have been mentioned as likely candidates to succeed Judge Butler on the bench.

It is the intention of Judge Butler to return to the practice of his profession and he will probably locate in Condon, Gilliam county.

Fruit Men Plan Exchange

Fruitgrowers of Idaho, Oregon and Washington at a meeting in Seattle organized the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, a co-operative agency to

handle the business of the fruitgrowers of the three states. The headquarters of the exchange will be established immediately at Portland, Oregon, and branch agencies will be placed in all the important market centers of the country.

Its purpose is the co-ordination of the fruitgrowing interests of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana and the centralizing of the handling and marketing of fruit grown in all the best districts in these states through one channel.

REALTY FRAUDS ALLEGED

Realty Frauds Alleged.

SALEM.—Attorney-General A. M. Crawford has directed a letter to District Attorney Cameron, of Multnomah county, calling his attention to the townsite of Hillman in Crook county and suggesting that the subject might be worthy an official investigation.

He said that the town is platted on a rockpile in a desert near where one of the proposed lines of railroad is surveyed. He says there are no houses there, or any other buildings, although the advertising matter shows banks, hotels and buildings on the town plat. For a while, he says, there was one tent on the land.

He was requested by the county officials to call Cameron's attention to the conditions and if possible bring the parties causing the alleged fraud into the courts. The land is practically valueless, he asserts, for any purpose whatever and is so situated that no one will ever become an inhabitant there. He incloses a photograph of the place showing the solitary tent and also some advertising matter.

NEWS ITEMS OF OTHER CITIES

By a deed just completed the ownership of the First National Bank of Lebanon has changed hands.

The police are seeking the identity of the persons or persons who are passing a quantity of confederate money in Portland.

Enterprise is to have a new state bank and a charter has already been applied for. William C. Hinterman, of Salt Lake City, is the promoter.

If present plans are carried out, one of the features of the County Grange fair to be held at Forest Grove this fall will be a milch cow contest.

J. C. Cooper, secretary of the Commercial club of McMinnville, accepted an invitation from the University of Oregon to deliver a lecture on walnut culture at Eugene Monday evening.

Eighty years old, tired of life and fearing she would become a burden to relatives, Mrs. Regula Seether of Portland donned a bathing suit at Seaside, waded into the surf and allowed herself to drown.

Armed with requisition papers, Deputy Sheriff Mortensen left Roseburg for San Francisco to bring back F. M. McDonald, wanted at Glendale, Douglas county, on a charge of embezzlement.

Albert Abraham, state senator, of Roseburg, has filed his petition to become candidate for governor, declaring that he is in favor of the primary plan.

State Fish Warden Clanton says the prospects are excellent for a large take of salmon eggs this season at the various stations in the Columbia river district.

After a journey across the continent for the purpose of effecting a reconciliation with her husband, who, she says, deserted her ten years ago, Mrs. Edward Mathews, of Cincinnati, arrived in Portland, only to learn that her helpmate had given her the slip and is now in the Deschutes country.

An automobile rate war has broken out at Shaniko between the independent automobiles and the Cornett Stage & Stable company and the Central Oregon Automobile company, the latter two being the principal companies handling interior passenger traffic from that point.

Oregon's apple show, to be held in Portland November 30 to December 2, inclusive, is going to be the largest and best ever conducted under the auspices of the Oregon Horticultural society. The premium list will contain many attractive prizes. This list will be completed soon, and will be distributed throughout the state.

County surveyors are at work establishing grade stakes for the proposed Portland to Hood River road along the Columbia. The right-of-way has been surveyed and grades are being established as rapidly as possible and it is thought that everything will be in readiness to begin actual construction work in a month or two.

Surveys have been completed by the state engineer on the Rogue river project and the next move is to adjudicate the water rights. Superintendent H. L. Holgate, of Klamath Falls, has not set a date for hearing, but it is probable the hearing will be held some time during September. This is a large project and there are fully 5000 claimants who are interested.

After causing the loss of three lives and destroying 3,000,000 feet of timber and machinery valued at \$5000, the Santiam forest fire is under control. It was checked by the digging of five miles of trenches which prevented further spread of the flames among the humus covering of the soil. The fire started on July 19, near Hoover, on the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, and is said to have been the result of carelessness on the part of employees of the Hoover Lumber company, which is the greatest loser.

As the aftermath of the indictment of J. Thornburn Ross, John E. Altchison and Frank B. Holbrook for conspiracy to defraud the United States of arid lands under the desert land act, civil suits have been started in the federal courts for the recovery of 640 acres, the only lands to which patent is said to have been secured as a result of the alleged conspiracy.
