## NEWS ITEMS OF OTHER CITIES

The treasury department has advertised for bids to be opened September 12 for supplying about \$5000 worth of furniture at the Portland federal building.

The largest exhibit of poultry ever shown on the Pacific Coast will be displayed this year at the Oregon State Fair at Salem, which opens Monday, September 12. There will be 1200 birds on exhibition.

Three carloads of Gravenstein apples will be shipped to London by the Salem Fruit Union. This is the first time in the history of the city and such shipment has ever been attempted, and it is considered a signal victory for organization of fruit interests in the valley.

Retraced by finger prints on a window by which they had entered the residence of Mrs. John Olson of Portland, two amateurs in crime, aged 5 and 14 respectively, were captured by detectives, and the loot which they had concealed recovered.

The county court of Coos County met this week to conclude the business of the year which represents the largest outlay of money for public improvements in any one year in the history of the county. Much has been done for the advancement of the rural districts.

Declaring that the county jails in Oregon were a disgrace to the present standards of civilization, Senator Albert Abraham, of Roseburg, candidate for the republican nomination for governor, asserts he will inspect many county jails in the state in the course of the next few months.

Portland has been the mecca for check forgers during the past month, and the detective department has been overwhelmed with complaints from victims. Despite the capture of nine during the month of August many merchants and saloon men continue to accept slips from those unknown to them.

Saturday was the last day for candidates to file for the coming primaries. The complete list of candidates shows 83 republican candidates and 20 democratic candidates. There are six candidates for governor alone, of which four are republicans, and seven candidates for congress.

Five hundred Chinese pheasants will be imported into Louisiana by the game commission and distributed in sections where these birds can thrive and propagate their kind. Mr. F. M. Miller, chief warden of the commission, has placed an order for this number of birds with a fancier at Corvallis, Ore.

The pioneers of Southern Oregon, when they meet in the historic old town of Jacksonville this fall for their annual reunion, will discuss plans for the erection of a log cabin to contain the relics of early pioneer days. The log cabin will be typical of early life in Oregon, with spinning wheel, rawhide-bottomed chairs and coonskin tacked to the door.

Briefs in answer to the demurrer of the Oregon & California Railroad company to the federal suit begun September 4, 1909, to compel the company to sell to settlers land conveyed to the corporation by the terms of the congressional land grant of 1886 have been filed in the United States circuit court at Portland, thus protecting the rights of 3000 intervenors in the suit.

Engene is planning a big apple show during the latter part of October or the first of November. It is planned to place several boxes of expertly packed apples in each show window of all the stores on the principal business thoroughfare of the city, and display them in an attractive manner. Suitable prizes will be given to growers who have the best exhibits. This show will be held just previous to the big apple fair in Portland and the best of the local exhibits will be taken to that city to compete for prizes there.

Notice has been sent to all the railroad corporations in Oregon aside from the lines that make up the Harriman system, to the effect that all figures, estimates and other evidence for determining the physical valuation of the roads in this state must be in the hands of the commission by September 15. The valuations of the Harriman lines, that is, the Southern Pacific, Oregon Railway & Navigation Company and branch lines, has been completed. Only the smaller roads have not yet been completed and they had been given all summer to prepare their estimates.
