SUBMARINE MINES PLANTED

FORT STEVENS Great activity in submarine work is apparent at Fort Stevens. The entire river mouth has been carefully laid out and systems of laying submarine mines so ar possible for attacking vessels to ever sately pass by. These mines are so constructed that their explosion is completely controlled by electric contrack an approaching vessel, await the moment it is over a group of mines, touch an electric button and is reduced to a many of wreckage, which is swallowed in a wild vortex of fosming, swirling water. The submarine mines are also arranged so that they can be made to explode by contact, a mere touch from the enemy's boat sufficing to eliminate itself.
