## NEWS ITEMS OF OTHER CITIES

Banner prices are being realized by Rogue River Valley pear growers in eastern markets, an average price of \$3.33 a box for three carloads of Bartlett's having been received.

G. H. Schildmuller, the Dartmouth College football star, has arrived in Corvallis prepared to take up his duties as coach of the college football team for the present season.

A change in the grading of apples has been made by the Fruit Growers' Union of Freewater. Instead of being graded in tiers, each box will be stamped with the number of apples it contains.

A site for public docks for Coos Bay in the future has been bought by the commissioners of the Port of Coos Bay. The members have bought 13 lots along the waterfront of Marshfield in the north part of the city.

In seventeen legislative districts in the state of Oregon no candidates have appeared in opposition to assembly candidates now in the field. These seventeen districts represent 24 seats in the house and senate at the next legislature.

Statistics compiled by the reclamation service officials show that during the current year 4,994 acres of Klamath irrigated land were used for the production of alfalfa. The average yield was 3.65 tons per acre.

One of the most expensive bits of road building the O. R. & N. company has ever undertaken is now in progress between Pendleton and Yoakum and will be completed within the next two or three months. The work covers but 12 1/2 miles of construction, but will cost approximately \$1,200,000.

The fall session of the new state school for the deaf will open September 28. The new buildings for which the last legislature appropriated \$75,000, have been completed and are being made ready for occupancy. Those formerly occupied have been transferred to the state sanitarium for the treatment of tuberculosis.

Much to the surprise of those in touch with affairs, the original description of lands to be thrown open in Wallowa County for settlement on October 21, and for entry on November 21, have been found to be entirely wrong, and new descriptions have been ordered and published by the La Grand Land Office.

The town of Hermiston has asked for a special day at the "Round-up," the big Northwest frontier celebration to be held in Pendleton. Friday, September 30, has been named as Hermiston day. The schools, business houses and offices will close and a special excursion train will bring practically the entire population to Pendleton that day.

A movement has been started to make Mount Hood a national park. Petitions are now being prepared for circulation all over the State of Oregon. These petitions ask the federal government to withdraw that part of Mount Hood now in the forest reserve and other portions included in United States properties, making of the whole a great park similar to the Yellowstone national park.

The final survey of the Oregon Trunk line is being made by the engineers of that road who are working on the northern shore of Upper Klamath Lake and the line as now being surveyed will run within two miles of Pelican Lodge, E. H. Harriman's famous country seat. It will take three weeks to complete the work in this part of the state and the corps of engineers are working toward the east.

State Engineer John R. Lewis has approved the government's filing on rights for irrigation of the 60,000-acre tract adjoining the Umatilla project, known as the East Umatilla project, which was recently inspected by the United States army engineers. The government must start work by September 15, 1911, or the filing of Andrew A. Smith, of Portland, which is next in priority, will be taken up by the board of control.

The Milton-Freewater Fruit Growers' union has had an exceptionally profitable and busy season, having shipped 366 cars of fruit, 156 of which were prunes. The apple crop is now being sold. The lower grade has been disposed of at the average price of 70 cents a box, a little lower than last year's average. One hundred carloads of apples will be shipped immediately.
