

FIRST CAR LOAD LEAVES FOR EAST

Ross Nelson and Dave Collins are just in receipt of a ton and a half of apple wrapping paper and a car load of boxes which are to be used in taking care of their apple crop this season. They have engaged an expert packer from southern Oregon to look after the boxing of their apples. Their first car load of apples will go from here to New York this week and it will be the first car load ever shipped from Independence, that is, of graded apples from a commercial orchard.

Messrs. Nelson and Collins are starting out to make a name for Polk county apples and will label all apples sent from their orchards as "Polk county apples." These are the only apples at this time of a commercial quantity in Polk county, outside of the Wallace orchard near Salem, though there are large acreages of orchards coming on near here, and that Polk county will lead in this industry goes without saying with such men as we have engaging in their culture.

Will Improve Harbor

Tillamook and Bay City have taken effective steps to secure the improvement of their harbors. The port commissions of these two cities will cooperate with the national government in the work and will add to the fund provided for the purpose in the rivers and harbors appropriation. It is estimated that the work of improvement will cost about \$2,000,000. Tillamook and Bay City have pledged \$550,000 of this amount. The preliminary examination of the Tillamook waterways has just been made by Major Jay J. Morrow, the government engineer in charge of this district, and work on the improvement will begin as soon as feasible.
