FIGHT AGAINST NEW COUNTIES

The Eugene Guard and Register have each written to the publisher of the Enterprise with the following request:

"As a newspaper publisher I am sure you want to set your readers right on questions submitted to the voters at the coming election. And because of this fact, I desire to call your attention to the many proposed new counties upon which all of the voters of the state are called upon to pass judgement. In most instances only local questions are involved and local interests affected by the proposed changes in boundary lines; and some if not all of the new counties are unjust to the old counties from which they are carved.

"To offset this new county craze an organization has been formed having for its object the defeat of all these new county schemes, on the broad ground that such questions should be left to settlement by the people of the territory affected—not by the state at large. Such a bill entirely just and fair in its provisions has been initiated and will appear on the ballot; and in the meantime the co-operation of the state press is asked to assist in defeating the new county bills, which will appear on the official ballot in November.

"It is not proposed to single out any particular new county and measure for defeat, but to oppose all of them on the ground that such questions should not properly be submitted to vote of the state at large. Feeling that you will take favorable views of this matter, the committee in charge of publicity work has asked the American Press Association to send you free of charge plate matter which will contain the arguments advanced in favor of their position on the county division question. If you can see your way clear to give this matter or any part of it space in your paper it will be duly appreciated by the committee."
