A FEW IDEAS ABOUT SOWING ALFALFA

First plow your ground just as early in the spring as the ground is in good condition to plow. Do not harrow or disc; in fact let the ground alone until the weather is warm enough to sow the seed which will be after the middle of April or the first of May. Then harrow two or three times when the ground is dry so as to kill the weeds and make a fine seed bed about three inches deep. The soil under that seed bed will be settled hard enough for the tap root of the plant to get a start, and it won't dry out and die.

Clod mash the ground and then sow from 16 to 20 lbs. of seed to the acre, then harrow light once over with a smoothing harrow. About the first of July run your mower over the field and cut the alfalfa down to keep it from blooming; then if you have any hogs turn them in but do not pasture too close the first year and do not pasture at all in the winter. Now a few don't's; Don't plow late in the spring and sow alfalfa as the ground will be so loose that it will dry out and die. Don't disc after the plowing as that will do the same thing. One of my neighbors plowed his field the last of April and sowed it to alfalfa and did not get a stand at all. I plowed my field the first of March and then let it alone until the last week in April, giving the ground a good chance to settle, then harrowed and clod mashed and sowed and got a fine stand of alfalfa. I fed my cows on alfalfa hay the fore part of this winter and they gave plenty of milk but when I run out of alfalfa hay and went to feeding clean oat hay they fell off half in their milk. I have some alfalfa hay that I put up for my hogs and I am feeding them now and they are looking fine. Any kind of creek or river bottom land will grow alfalfa, and after the first year you can cut from two to three crops of hay without irrigation. Be sure to get dry land alfalfa seed. It makes the best hogs pasture of anything I ever raised. Now if anyone wants to see how we are going in for alfalfa let them come out to the American Bottom, situated six and one-half miles southeast of Independence, and you can see alfalfa in four year old, three year old and two year old fields, and some just sown for I am going to sow more alfalfa in the spring.
