Work to Connect Coast With Main Southern Pacific Road.

Portland.-New steamer service and a railway project for Cocs Bay were business subjects that took C. J. Millis, superintendent of the Harriman steamship line between this port and Coos Bay, to San Francisco for a month. He returned Sunday.

Mr. Millis' conference with leading Harriman officials in San Francisco involved the placing, if necessary, of a steamship service between Coos Bay and San Francisco, and the early construction of a railroad into that place to connect with the main Southern Pacific line running between Portland and San Francisco

Since the government, aided by the people of Coos Bay, has begun improving the harbor and the river channel at Coos Bay, the port has received considerable attention.
