## ITEMS OF INTEREST IN OREGON

### IMPORTANT EVENTS OF INTEREST TO OUR READERS.

Chronicle of Brief News from Different Sections of the State of Oregon.

#### Department Store Field.

Portland.—By the sale of a majority interest of the firm of Olds, Wortman & King, a deal involving between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 has been concluded, and the big department store operated by that firm passes to the control of Max Holtz of New York and his brother, Aaron Holtz, the latter having been for some time junior partner in the company.

#### More Land for Branch Asylum.

Pendleton.—Governor West and Treasurer Kay have completed the purchase of 24½ more acres to be used with other land already bought as the site for the eastern Oregon branch insane asylum. This tract is what is known as the Charles Myers place and adjoins the Carpenter tract on the west. This gives the state possession of all of the land in this bottom, with the exception of 10 acres owned by C. C. Hendricks. It is reported that the state will soon start condemnation proceedings to obtain ownership of this property as Mr. Hendricks has boosted his price to an exorbitant figure.

#### Arbor Day to Be April 14.

Salem.—Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman has announced that Arbor Day will be April 14 this year, and is preparing a circular letter which will be sent out to the schools of the state and others interested.

It has been the custom to prepare a special pamphlet containing an Arbor Day program and suggestions appropriate to the day, but the superintendent has practically decided to forego the publication of this booklet and later in the year will prepare a book containing programs for all of the special holidays.

#### Work to Connect Coast With Main Southern Pacific Road.

Portland.—New steamer service and a railway project for Coos Bay were business subjects that took C. J. Mills, superintendent of the Harriman steamship line between this port and Coos Bay, to San Francisco for a month. He returned Sunday.

Mr. Mills' conference with leading Harriman officials in San Francisco involved the placing, if necessary, of a steamship service between Coos Bay and San Francisco, and the early construction of a railroad into that place to connect with the main Southern Pacific line running between Portland and San Francisco.

Since the government, aided by the people of Coos Bay, has begun improving the harbor and the river channel at Coos Bay, the port has received considerable attention.

#### Scales at Salem Inaccurate.

Salem.—A report of the United States bureau of standards which has been forwarded to Governor West by S. W. Stratton, director, discloses the fact that only 32 per cent of the scales in use in the city of Salem were found to be correct as the re-

sult of an inspection made by the department in December, 1910. At Oregon City 51 per cent of the scales in use were correct and at Portland where there are ordinances regulating standard weights and measures 65 per cent of the scales were found to be correct.

#### Negro Kills Woodchopper.

Canyonville.—A negro hobo walking the railroad track, when one mile west of Wolf Creek, stopped at the house of a woodchopper, demanded something to eat, then got into an altercation with the man of the house, and the negro seized a rifle from the wall and shot the man, the ball passing through his arm and body near the heart. The victim lived to tell the story, dying in three hours. The negro took the rifle and fled to the hills.
