PATRONS WANT HIGH SCHOOL

For Higher Education

An enthus astle meeting was held at Buena Vista, Tuesday night, March 14, by tthhe patrons of that school district, assisted by the patrons from four surrounding districts. The purpose of the gathering was to determine the sentiment in Tegard to the proposal for the establishmen of a High School at Buena Vista, N. M. Prather was chalrman, and there were nearly a hundred interested voters present. The question had been thoroughly discussed before in advance, and when it was put to a vote all but two announced themselves in favor of building a high school, and the school board was instructed to call a s e al school meeting for the purpose of taking a formal vote to decide the matter.
