## MORE MEN AP- PAY FOR JOB

### REJOICES OVER PAY INCREASE R. F. D. MEN

A Washington, D. C., Organ Quotes  
Hawley—Reprints Miss McMunn Article.

The R. F. D. News, the national organ for the rural free delivery employees, published at Washington, D. C., in its March number, contains an article rejoicing over the passage of the bill increasing the pay of carriers on routes of 24 miles or over to \$1000 per year.

In the same number there is reprinted the article of Miss Ella McMunn, in the Statesman, on the funeral of Frank P. Litchfield, the rural carrier who recently died in Salem—a tribute, by the way, which deserves the title of classic.

The same number of the R. F. D. News contains the following article: "Hawley supports the increase."

"Congressman Willis C. Hawley of Oregon said:

"I favor an increase in the compensation paid to the carriers in the rural free delivery service much larger than proposed, but will support this increase of \$100 per annum on regular routes as a step in the right direction. These men must furnish and maintain an equipment for transporting the mails over their routes at their own expense, and which takes a comparatively large proportion of their yearly salaries. These salaries should be sufficiently large so that after paying their living expenses and the cost of maintaining their equipment they will have left a reasonable sum as a saving for the future. I hope in the succeeding bill a more adequate compensation will be provided."

### SUIT AGAINST RAILROAD

Zoller Hop Company Seeks to Recover Damages for Alleged Ruin of Crop

A suit against the Southern Pacific company for \$1234.51 was filed yesterday in circuit court by the Zoller Hop company.

In November, 1909, the plaintiff alleges, a shipment of 100 bales of hops was sent from here consigned to C. Schmidt & Sons of Philadelphia, Pa. The car which the company used, the plaintiff avers, was defective, so that dampness and cold ruined 23 bales of the hops, and the plaintiff now sues to recover damages.

Attorneys John H. and C. L. McNary represent the plaintiff.
