TO DISPOSE OF PROPERTY

IMPORTANT TO STOCK HOLDERS OF CANNERY

Committee Appointed to Sell Property Actively Engaged

At an adjourned meeting of the stockholders of the Independence cannery held last Saturday, questions of vital importance to the association were discussed pro and con, and it developed that the property must be sold or let it go to satisfy the mortgage now standing against it.

Finally the stockholders authorized the board of directors to sell the property for not less than 50 per cent of its original cost, which will be sufficient to pay off the indebtedness and leave something for the stockholders. The president was authorized to appoint a committee of three to get the consent of stockholders and their shares to dispose of within thirty days from the date of the meeting, that much time having been granted by the mortgagor. The committee consists of E. E. Paddock, J. L. Hanna and P. M. Kirkland, who are presently securing shares to be disposed of.

The stockholders are placed in a position where they must either turn the stock over to the committee to be disposed of and realize a little therefrom, or let it go by default and realize nothing. By calling upon P. M. Kirkland at his drug store satisfactory arrangements can be made for the sale of the property.

It is understood that parties here are willing to purchase the property at the terms stated and the factory will eventually be put in operation without a doubt.

A. O. U. W. IS GROWING IN INTEREST

J. B. Gentry of Portland, representing the Ancient Order of United Workmen, is in Independence, visiting the local lodge of that order. Since the A. O. U. W. has become independent in Oregon it has come to the front as the strongest financially in the state. It is also the only order that gives a guaranteed rate, and carries a cash loan, paid up or extended insurance.
