

# HORSE SHOW FOR SALEM

ALL RECORDS BOTH FOR HORSES ON EXHIBITION AND VISITORS TO SEE THEM WILL BE BROKEN AND SPLINTERED.

One thousand dollars will be distributed in the way of premiums by the Salem Horse Show association at the horse show which will hold in that city on April 7 and 8, and because of the expenditure of this large sum of money in premiums alone and because the exhibition will be one which will be equal to any ever held in the state keen interest is being shown with relation to it by prominent horsemen in western and southern Oregon.

The show he'd last year was a grand success and the present promises to eclipse it in every particular. There were on exhibition last year a splendid lot of horses—a fine lot as has ever been shown in the west and every horseman assembled returned to his home satisfied with the exhibition. These men have advertised the exhibition of last year and it means a larger attendance in the way of horsemen, and that in turn means a larger exhibition of horses. The present indications are that the show will be a success from every point in view and those in charge of the matter are laboring hard to make preparation for the accommodation of the horsemen and the large crowd of people that the show will naturally attract.

### The Program

The exhibition grounds will be at the same place as last year—Church street between State and Court. The seats secured for last year's show are in a good state of preservation and can be used again. This portion of Church street will be roped off and the seats will be arranged in an arena form, so that the spectators may secure good views of the animals which will pass before the judges in the contest for premiums.

The first day will start off with a parade in which the horses on exhibition will be the feature. The afternoon will be devoted to the passing of judgment on the horses by the judges and the awarding of premiums. The second day will also start off with a parade and the afternoon be devoted to the awarding of premiums and on the afternoon of both days there will be conducted a monster horse sale. This sale was a winning feature last year—so winning that the demand was so great for it again that the association decided to make it a part of the show this year. Any owner of stock who desires to sell may enter his stock with the managers of the sale.

### Much Interest Aroused

Since the announcement was made some time ago that the association would hold another show this spring, the secretary, Charles Yankee, has been buried with correspondence from horsemen making inquiries in regard to the show. All of them signify the keenest interest in the exhibition and that the greater portion of them will bring their horses to the show goes without the saying.

At a meeting held by the association several evenings ago committees were appointed to make arrangements for the holding of the show and also to solicit funds. The finance committee is making fine progress and it hopes within a short time to have the amount necessary to hold the show fully subscribed.

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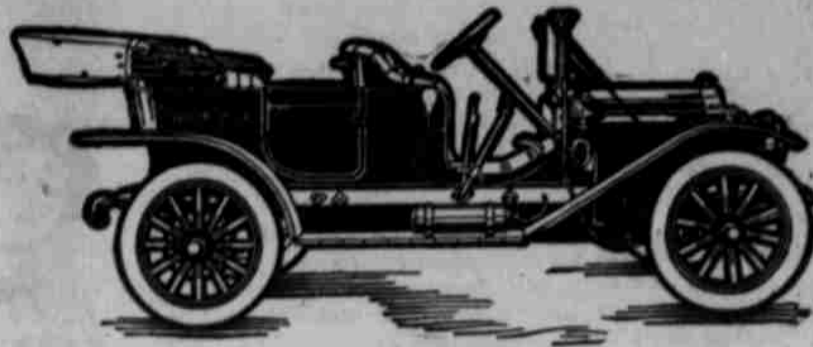
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
