Editor Independence Enterprise:—Dear Sir:—In your last issue I see your head lines read like this: "Seems Like A Rank Injustice. Late Census Report Shows A Small Decrease."
Let us take up the conditions as they exist before we censure the parties taking the census. First, Independence has grown—our schools have grown, but if you will look at the conditions as they exist, you will find that Independence has not progressed along certain lines as her neighbor towns have.
Take Independence's boundary line and you will find that every man who wanted to get out of paying city taxes would have the corporate lines run around his property instead of including it in the incorporate limits as it would have been, consequently Independence has decreased in size as well as in population. For illustration the smallest school boy attending either of the schools can stand on the school grounds and throw a stone outside of the city limits. Is this even justice to these property owners, who are holding their property expecting the town of Independence to grow, and make their property more valuable?
It does not appeal to me as a business proposition to continue this line of thoughtless business calculation. First, the growth of the town has

lets, schools and churches, which has been multiplying their capital many fold.
