Independence Driving Park Association Anticipate a Good Time.

The Driving Park Association has come to the front again this year with a fine program for the spring meet to be held in this city Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, June 21, 22 and 23. The committee has put up nearly \$2000 in purses and prizes for the races and stock show and the three days meet this year promises to be the greatest event in the history of the association.

Several fine horses are now at the track, among which are three thoroughbreds owned by Wm. Percival, resident of the Association, and judging from what is said of them it will require some good stake horses to best them. C. O. Groves has a 3-year-old stallion, Paramount, a handsome brown trotter, and also a 3-year-old mare, Queen B., a pacer which the owner has great confidence in. Peter Cook of Rickreall and Independence, has three head at the track all promising animals, namely: Sally Young, Mark and Veila, a very pretty black mare by Polmort Boy, and if size and strength count in a race these horses bid fair to take some of the money. Rice Cook has a fine little pacer, S's Bender, and also Mark Holmes, a bay stallion, both of which are capable of putting up a warm contest. R. P. Dickinson, another Independence horse admirer, has a bright looking young stallion known as Yaffe, and is considered a very promising trotter. C. Feek expects to enter a fine colt in the 2-year-old class and there are probably others in Independence whom we have not heard mentioned, who will enter the races with fast horses. A number of good horses from out of town will take an active part in the entertainment, and the three days' meet this year will be filled with sensation.

The stock show will play no small part in the entertainment, and in this department liberal prizes are offered.

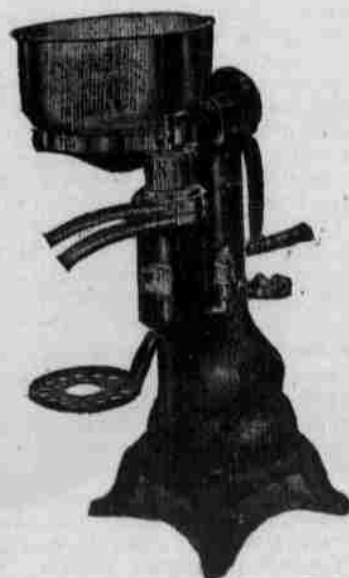
