One man, who came here from Portland to make his home, was compelled to rent rooms in a private home simply because the city does not provide tenement houses enough to accommodate people living here. We know of no reason why men of means will allow such a stagnation of affairs in a city so prosperous and one which is growing so rapidly. The more houses Independence provides the greater will be the increase in population. If we expect a city of ten thousand in ten years, as some one has already predicted, we must begin to prepare for it now.

Winter will soon be on and people who desire to come in from the country and other towns on account of the opportunities of school will be

forced to seek homes in other towns unless something is done at once to relieve the crowded condition of the residence portion of the city.

Eminent Independence Minister Tells of His Interesting Visit to the Holy Land.

Steam Ship "Congo" In Mediterranean Sea.

To the Editor of the Enterprise:

We have been aboard this Steamship, four days, having sailed from Marseilles, France, at noon on the 13th and this is our last night aboard as we will arrive in Alexandria before daylight.

Landing at Liverpool, on July 2nd, we spent nine very strenuous days in and about London. I have neither the time nor the space to tell of the many places of interest seen. One day was given to Bedford about 70 miles from London, which is the scene of the life and labors of John Bunyan of "Pilgrims Progress," and another day at Stratford-on-Avon, the home of Shakespeare. In London we visited the Tower, so celebrated in History, viewed the crown jewels, including the crown worn by their Majesties at the recent coronation, Westminster Abbey, decorated and arranged as it was on the day of the coronation, and was within 3 yards of the famous Coronation Chair; St. Pauls, and time will fail to tell the many historical places in the vicinity of the Abbey.

I was fortunate enough to see the King and Queen when driving from Berkham Palace with the Prince of Wales and Princess Mary, for I was seated upon the upper deck of a "train" as they drove by.

We left London for Paris on the 10th, crossing the English Channel from Newhaven to Dieppe. Most of the party paid tribute to Neptune and were pretty near "frazzled," but I was not at all sick and enjoyed every moment of the trip.

After one day and two nights in Paris we came south to Marseilles, from which port we sailed on noon of the 13th. We passed between the volcanic island of Stronboli and, during the afternoon, passed through the straits of Messina, the scene of the Classic "Scilla and Charybdis." On the east was the coast of Italy and on the west the island of Sicily and, as the channel is quite narrow, we had a plain view of the ruined city of Messina, which was so terribly overthrown by an earthquake a year or more ago. Today we passed south of the island of Crete and will be in Alexandria before morning. As we near the equator it is getting very warm. I prespire as I sit here in the ship's writing room. We have been wonderfully favored with good weather, having had a calm sea, both on the Atlantic and Mediterranean, although the English Channel did roll us about a little.

From Alexandria we go to Cairo, view the Pyramids then to Joppa and Jerusalem, and, after the Holy Land, to Athens, Naples, Rome, etc., and back to London possibly about Aug. 15th or 20th. Party all well. Kindest regards to all.

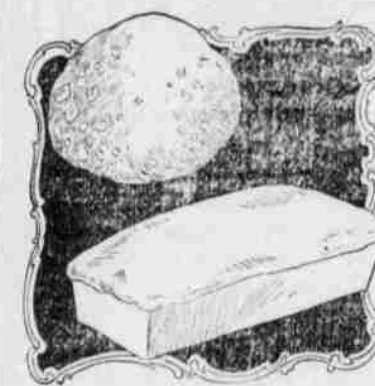
