NEEW RECORD FOR HARD RUN

Having stood a little over nine months, the record to Tillamook established by D. S. DuBois in a Franklin six-cylinder automobile early last September, was lowered 41 minutes yesterday morning by Frank Cary, driving a Michigan "33." He made the run from Portland to the coast in 4 hours and 47 minutes. This mark, which is official, was the full time required for the trip, and included all stops for water, oil and passing of teams. Twelve minutes was lost in stops.

What makes this run more remarkable is that a detour of three miles had to be made just outside of Willamina, where the road is being repaired.

Just as the hands of the watches pointed to 4:50 A. M., Cary threw in

the clutch and the car shot forward from the Postoffice corner of Fifth and Morrison streets. One hour and 20 minutes later it passed through McMinnville, having lowered the official record for the 35.5 miles. The car, still carrying its full load, the driver and Clement W. Ausman, of the Telegram, kept on going and reached Willamina two hours after leaving Portland. Here water was taken on and the trip through the mountains was made. At 9:45 the auto rolled or rather skidded, around the corner to a position in front of the Tillamook telephone office.

Another Portland party to try for the record was driven down by Harry L. Keats, in a Pope-Hartford touring car. The time was 5 hours and 19 minutes. These cars acted as pilots for the first official Portland Automobile Club run to Bayocean, which will be made next Saturday.—These cars are sold by R. M. Wade & Co.
