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PAVING IS DONE

Well, the paving is over with for this year and we are all glad, in a way, that it is over. The question as it confronts us now, is, "How shall we preserve the pavement the longest and what steps can we take to prevent its destruction."

Experience in cities that have had cement pavements for years in the past, shows that in order to keep cement pavement from getting holes in it and keeping these holes from enlarging and eventually raising a large area of the surface, is to have an organized, responsible street committee, have them provided with materials and tools and as soon as a hole or crack makes its appearance in the surface of the street, have it fixed.

While not in the least gainsaying the job of paving in this city, it is but reasonable to believe that the pavement will not remain in tact always without some attention. In order to do justice to the city and especially those who have paid for the improvement of the streets, it is but right that some such organization, as suggested, be established.

When we consider that the pavement just completed is, in a way, an experiment, and that the future improvements along this line will depend largely upon the satisfaction, durability, etc., of the new hard surface pavement just completed, it behooves those interested in the welfare and progress of Independence to endeavor make the improvements of the city as satisfactory and popular as possible.

In the matter of the preservation of our new cement streets let us remember that "a stitch in time saves nine" and let us not only remember that but that if we don't take good care of this new suit of clothes we can't ever have another.

STAY ON THE FARM

On the other hand, hosts of farm lads, dissatisfied with the simple and unvarying course of the farm life which, from distorted views, had become monotonous and irksome to them plunged into the uncertainties of the already thronged cities, only to discover that their expectations were illusive and vain. So crowded have become the avenues of business endeavor by seekers after clerical employment that commercial enterprises in the important centers of trade can arbitrarily fix the wages paid to applicants for work. The conditions for patronage, never compete to help the farmer boy as do they on the farm.

The successful husbandman and contented farmer boy should be inseparable if achievements are attained, both on the farm and in the city, for the success of commercial pursuits depends upon the success of the farm. Stay on the farm, boys, and when active life has finished its course you will have nothing to regret.

There has been formed in the Middle West, a league which will promote the "more abundant growth of apples by scientific methods." Let them promote. They will learn by experience that it is not "scientific methods" that they need—it is Williams' Valley land.
