Notice of Meeting of Board of Equalization

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, the 16th day of October, 1911, the Board of Equalization will meet at the County Courthouse in the city of Dallas, in the county of Polk, State of Oregon, to examine and correct all assessment rolls, to correct all errors in valuation, lots or other property, or incorrectly assessed as to description or quantity, or where assessed in the name of a person not the owner thereof or assessed under or beyond the actual cash value thereof, and to assess all lands, lots and other property appearing to have been omitted or that was not assessed.
Petitions or applications for the reduction of a particular assessment shall be made in writing, verified by the oath of the applicant or his attorney and be filed with the board during the first week it is by law required to be in session, and any petition or application not so made, verified and filed shall not be considered or acted upon by the board.
