Paper Plates for Animal Pats.
Using paper plates for animal pats will be found to be a good plan. COSTLY 3-CENT PIECE

PITTSBURG MERCHANT HAS ONE THAT COST HIM \$75.

Tells of the Time He Met With Affordable Stranger in Kansas City—Keepsake From Young Man's Grandmother.
