COUNCIL IN SESSION

M. W. Mix, president of the council called the meeting to order Wednesday evening in absence of mayor Eldridge. The roll call found the following councilmen in their respective places: Dixon, Hubbard and Bohannon.

On motion of councilman Bohannon the recorder was instructed to draw warrant on the city treasury for \$1003.36 in payment of four sewer bonds and the interest.

W. M. Hamilton of Corvallis, was present and asked for a permit to run a popcorn wagon on the streets but owing to an ordinance now in force, compelling peddlers to pay a license of \$5.00 per day, the matter was deferred until such time as they can pass an ordinance permitting an enterprise of this kind to be maintained. It is probable that such arrangements will be made at the next meeting.

A. C. Reese of Portland, representing Louis C. Kelsey, Civil and Hydraulic Engineer, submitted a proposition to make estimate on the cost of putting in a gravity water system, and such other work as may be required during the coming summer. The matter was laid over until the next meeting.

Motion to adjourn prevailed.

The Commercial Club held its regular meeting in the council chambers Tuesday evening. The topic of interest was relative to the proposed electrification of the Southern Pacific Company of their railroad on this side of the river, and resolutions were adopted in compliance with the request of railroad officials made at a meeting held in Independence a few weeks ago.
