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TAFT SHOULD BE NAMED

Taft's headquarters at St. Louis, Mo., is sending out letters to voters in every part of the United States as follows:

"The only argument that has been advanced that in my opinion has any weight as far as Missourians are concerned, is that Taft might not carry the state this fall as compared with Mr. Roosevelt. Might I suggest, says the writer, to you that in 1908 Mr. Taft polled 25,750 more votes than Col. Roosevelt polled in Missouri in 1904? President Taft's opponent was Mr. Bryan, the strongest possible Democratic candidate in Missouri. Colonel Roosevelt's opponent was Mr. Parker, probably the weakest Democratic candidate in Missouri that was ever before the people.

Personally I feel that the future of the republican party in a great measure depends upon Mr. Taft's re-nomination.

TEACHERS RETAINED

MISS RICHARDSON DIES

Susan L. Richardson was born in Adams county, Ill., May 25, 1849. At the age of three years she, with her parents, crossed the plains to Oregon, residing near Bethel until the fall of 1853, when the family removed to Lane county, near Monroe.

In the spring of 1866 she returned to Bethel. She united with the Christian church in 1868.

The winter of 1871 she spent in Montana, returning again to Bethel the next year. In 1873 she located on a farm just north of Monmouth where she resided eleven years.

In 1883 she moved to Independence, where she resided until the time of her death, which occurred the 30th day of March, 1912, at the age of 62 years, 10 months and 5 days. She is survived by one sister, Sarepta A. Richardson, aged 59 years and one brother, John W. Richardson, aged 70 years.

The funeral services were held at her home in Independence Monday, April 1, 1912, after which she was laid to rest in the family burial grounds at Bethel.

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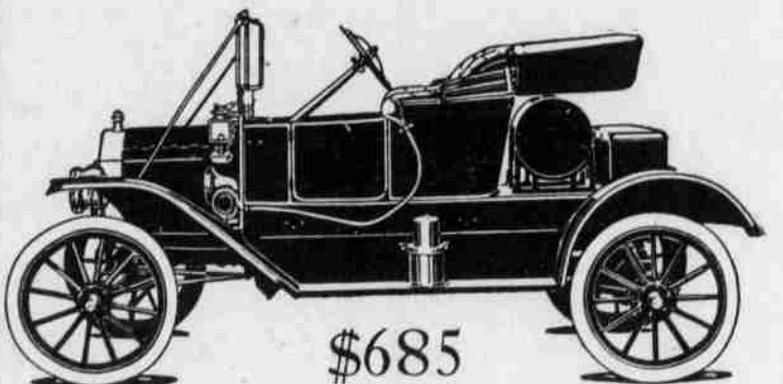
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
