NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

Conference Committee Has Reported Final Agreement on Borah Homestead Bill.

Washington.—The conference committee in charge of the Borah-Jones three-year homestead bill, reported what is declared to be a final agreement. The main features of the original bill are retained.

As the bill is agreed upon, the homestead period is reduced from five to three years and entrymen are permitted leave of absence of not to exceed five consecutive months each year, they being required to notify the local land office when they leave the land and of the date of their return.

A cultivation clause is incorporated which requires the entryman to cultivate not less than one-sixteenth of the area of his entry the second year and one-eighth the third year. The bill will apply to all entries, including enlarged homestead entries and all pending entries.

Entrymen who have not yet received a patent will have the privilege of completing their proof under the three year bill or continuing under the old law as they may prefer.

Army Bill Aimed at General Wood

The army appropriation bill was reported back to the senate and house by the conferees with the anti-administration amendments which would legislate Major-General Wood out of office as chief-of-staff, and would leave the location of military posts to a commission of retired army officers and two members each of the senate and house committees on military affairs.

The amendment which would remove General Wood also would prevent either Brigadier-Generals Crozier or Funston from ever attaining the office of chief-of-staff. No officer who has not spent 10 years in the line with troops before becoming a brigadier would be eligible.

Officers of Titanic Censured.

A sweeping arraignment of the conduct of officers of the Titanic, especially Captain Smith, is contained in the report of the senate commerce committee on the loss of the vessel. The officers are held responsible for the disaster because of failure to heed the warnings of other vessels. J. Bruce Ismay, who was a passenger, is also criticized. Lax inspection is charged to the British board of trade,

and the report calls attention to the lack of discipline on the vessel.

Luxuries Imported Enormous.

Luxuries imported into the United States during the fiscal year which ends with next month, will exceed \$200,000,000 in value. Under the term "luxuries" are included such articles as diamonds, art works, lace and embroidery, champagne and other wines, tobaccos and manufactures thereof, ostrich feathers, artificial flowers, toys, perfumeries and cosmetics, jewelry, manufactures of gold and silver, and numerous others of this general character.

National Capital Brevities.

The house is holding to its program for adjournment about June 15, although no understanding has been reached with the senate leaders, who are not optimistic.

A committee of the house has been appointed to consider the propriety of suggesting to President Taft that he offer his friendly aid as a mediator between Italy and Turkey.

Applications for pensions under the new "dollar a day" pension law are being received at the pension office here at about the rate of 25,000 a day. The total number received to date is 123,234.

There will evidently be no wool legislation at this session of congress. The senate finance committee has reported adversely the Underwood bill; it has abandoned the plan to draft a substitute bill, and has refused to report the Smoot substitute.

Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture has ordered Doctors Doolittle, Mitchell and Dunlap, of the pure food board, to conduct a test of the breweries throughout the country to determine whether the institutions are complying with the pure food laws.

The house judiciary committee was occupied the past week with the hearing of the charges against Judge Archbald of the commerce court. Evidence was introduced tending to show that Judge Archbald was a tool of the railroads and susceptible to bribery.

Brief News of the Week

Rioting convulsed the city of Budapest, Hungary, as a result of the government's defeat of universal suffrage.

In the presence of 200 persons, Dan Davis, a negro aged 21 years, was burned at the stake at Tyler, Texas, after confessing to an attack upon Carrie Johnson, a white girl.

With thousands of tons of perishable freight and foodstuffs rotting on the docks and wharves, the port of London is completely tied up as a result of the transport workers' federation strike.

The Hamburg-American line's new mammoth trans-Atlantic liner, Imperator, the biggest vessel in the world, was successfully launched at Hamburg, Germany, Emperor William acting as sponsor.

A verdict of not guilty was returned in the federal court at Chicago for the eight wall paper manufacturers and jobbers who were tried for alleged violation of the Sherman law in conspiring in restraint of trade.

Chinese of southern California, through their chamber of commerce in Los Angeles, have issued an appeal to the people of the coast asking them to join in a protest against the Dillingham exclusion bill, which has already passed the United States senate.

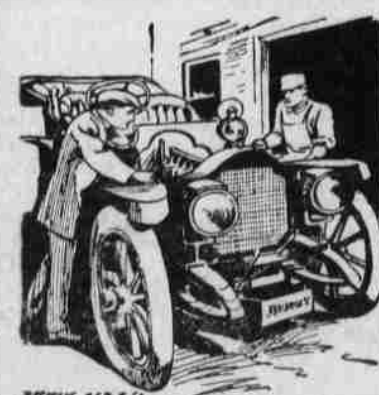
