CURRENT EVENTS OF THE WEEK

Doings of the World at Large Told in Brief.

General Resume of Important Events Presented in Condensed Form for Our Busy Readers.

A German aviator carried a passenger from Berlin to Vienna, 330 miles, in six hours and 35 minutes.

The rebel forces of Campa and Arguendo are reported to have been routed by Mexican federals.

Volcanic ash from the eruptions in Alaska, 1200 miles away, cover the trees and vegetation at Victoria, B. C.

A church in Upper Broadway, New York, City has established a play ground in its yard for mothers and their children.

The International Dancing Masters' association in convention in Chicago, has sounded the death knell of objectionable whirls and trots.

Julia Marlowe, noted American actress now playing in Tronto, Canada, has been ordered to take several months' rest, in order to avoid a complete break down.

A wealthy Chicago merchant employed an aeroplane to take him to the golf grounds of a friend 70 miles away, thus avoiding the crowded street and suburbs.

The governor of Alaska has been appealed to for help for the residents of several towns which are buried under a foot or more of ashes from the recent volcanic disturbances.

Nearly one hundred striking waiters were arrested in front of the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York, while trying to disturb a banquet given to visiting officers of the German navy.

Forty seniors of Yale college took the places of striking waiters at the Hotel Taft, at New Haven, Connecticut. When the dinner hour was over they themselves were given a banquet.

A strike and riot of prisoners at San Quentin, Cal., penitentiary was quelled only after one convict had been killed and several wounded. The liberal policy of Gov. West of Oregon, is blamed for the outbreak.

The cruiser Maryland will take the Oregon naval reserve for a practice cruise.

Two additional bomb explosions have occurred in San Francisco, both directed at owners of poolrooms.

The house of a Portland policeman was robbed of \$103.50 while he was out in the back yard for a few minutes.
