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INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND PROGRESS OF OUR HOME STATE

EXPERIMENT FARM URGED.

Dr. Withycombe Tells How Oregon Could Increase Wealth.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis—Dr. James Withycombe, director of the agricultural experiment station at Oregon Agricultural college and five sub-stations at Moro, Hermiston, Union, Burns and Talent, in his address before the ranchers who attended the Farmers' Roundup at Moro, emphasized the value of demonstration farm work as a means of introducing scientific methods of farming.

Dr. Withycombe stated that in his opinion, the maintenance of demonstration farms in each county in the state under competent supervision, would result, within the next five years, in increasing the agricultural products of the state \$10,000,000 annually. This could be accomplished, he said, without adding a square rod of ground to the present farm acreage.

Dr. Withycombe said in part: "Denmark has made phenomenal agricultural progress under this system of instruction. With an area equaling one-sixth that of our own state, Denmark supports 2,600,000 people and annually exports more than \$100,000,000 worth of butter, eggs and bacon. This result is accomplished under adverse agricultural conditions, much of the country being so bleak as to necessitate the blanketing of the cows to keep them comfortable while at pasture during the summer season."

RAISE "BUSTER BROWN" APPLES

"Yellow Kids" and "Mary Jane" Also Will Figure Prominently.

Hood River—Charles A. Barcher, of Chicago, who is interested with R. F. Outcault, the noted artist and cartoonist who originated "Buster Brown" and "Mary Jane," the children of a comic Sunday supplement, has been here this week on business and looking over the valley's orchard land. The land in which the cartoonist is interested is owned by several New York men. It comprises 1600 acres near Okanagan. A great many trees already have been set out. The remainder of the orchard is being cleared by a crew of negroes brought out from Kentucky.

"We are planting only Delicious, Jonathans and Yellow Newtowns," says Mr. Barcher. "A unique scheme has been devised by Mr. Outcault to make the boxes attractive and create a demand for the fruit. We will call the Delicious apples the 'Mary Janes,' the Jonathans, the 'Buster Browns,' and the Yellow Newtowns, the 'Yellow Kids.' Every apple will bear a wrapper and every box a label handsomely illustrated by an engraving from one of Mr. Outcault's drawings."

John Day Valley Rich.

"For good schools, fine farms, good orchards and rich resources Grant county compares favorably with any district in the state," said N. C. Maris, who has just made a trip into the John Day valley in the interest of the school children's industrial movement.

"The John Day valley, where most of my travel and work was confined during the last week, is one of the richest agricultural sections of the whole state. Their average annual precipitation in that county is something over 20 inches, insuring, with proper farming, good grain crops, but the John Day valley is largely devoted to the production of hay for the wintering of large bands of stock that traverse the splendid ranges during the grazing season, and for this purpose alfalfa is king. The John Day furnishes an abundant supply of water for irrigation purposes, producing three good crops of six to eight tons an acre in the aggregate. "This is one of the best natural hay and grass countries I have ever seen. I saw beautiful meadows of red and white clover, which I was told had never been seeded, but was simply a voluntary growth, mown regularly for years."

Chick 14 Weeks Old Lays.

Oregon City—Oregon Washburn, a poultry fancier of West Oregon City, is the owner of probably the youngest laying hen in the state.

The hen was hatched March 8 and laid its first egg June 24 and has been laying daily since. Its mother has hatched two broods since March 8. The chicken wonder is a white feathered-leg bantam, and under size even for that species. Mr. Washburn is confident the hen has established a new record for early laying.

June Rainfall is Light.

Astoria—The records in the office of Local Weather Observer Gilmore show that the rainfall in Astoria during the month of June was 4.14 inches, or 1.04 inches less than the average for the corresponding month of previous years. There were 11 days on which rain fell, 15 days were clear and 15 were cloudy. The maximum temperature was 90 degrees and the lowest was 43 degrees.

Milk Condenser to Resume.

Newberg—Arrangements have been perfected to resume operations at the milk condenser here, which was destroyed by fire several months ago. This is deemed a matter of much importance to Newberg, as the Chehalis valley is a famous dairy section and the condenser established a good trade.

BERRY CULTURE ADVISED.

Extensive Plans Laid for Making Unfermented Fruit Juice.

Marshfield—Extensive culture of Loganberries to be used for making unfermented fruit juice is an industry for Coos county which is proposed by the state fruit experts, who have been making a tour of education through the district. They advocate the Gravenstein apple as the most profitable to be grown in this locality commercially, and urge the farmers to take up the culture of Loganberries, which grow in abundance here and seem to be suited to most any of the land in the county. Heretofore, the Loganberry industry has not been carried on extensively for the reason that the local market was limited.

A. H. Carson, of Grants Pass, who is one of the party of experts, suggests that the people form a company and install a plant for extracting unfermented fruit juice, and that a sufficient acreage of Loganberries be planted to maintain the plant. He says a big industry can be created. He also has told the farmers that they can make money by having a co-operative dryer for handling Loganberries or even that a grower with as much as one acre or more can have his own dryer.

KLAMATH MILL WILL RUN.

Plant With 125,000-Foot Capacity is to Start in August.

Klamath Falls—Seventy men are at work on the Algoma Lumber company's new sawmill on Upper Klamath lake, and it is expected that the plant, second largest in Klamath county, will be in operation by August, according to R. H. Hovey, general manager of the company.

The mill will have a daily capacity of 125,000 feet. Surrounding the plant the company owns 150,000 acres of timber, and work has already been started on a logging railroad. This will be built four miles this season, and extended into the timber as necessary. The Algoma Lumber company formerly operated a large sawmill at Pockema, but its timber holdings were worked out, so last fall it purchased the holdings of D. B. Campbell at Rattlesnake Point, eight miles north of here on the railroad, consisting of tracts of valuable timber and a sawmill with a daily capacity of 125,000 feet.

CHAUTAUQUA PLANS READY.

Gladstone Park Will Be Well Lighted—Power Company Donates.

Oregon City—Secretary Cross, of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua assembly, has completed arrangements for lighting Gladstone Park during the meeting which will start July 9 and continue 12 days.

It is planned to have more lamps than ever before, and the grounds and building will be almost as light at night as in the day. The Portland Railway, Light & Power company has agreed to donate the electricity, following a precedent established several years ago. One of the largest crowds at the Chautauqua is expected July 14, when Charles Edward Russell, the journalist, will lecture on "Soldiers of the Common Good."

After serving as managing editor of the Minneapolis Journal and the Detroit Tribune, Mr. Russell went to New York and was a reporter for the New York Herald and for the New York World for several years.

Apple Orders Arrive.

Hood River—Orders for Hood River apples are already coming in to the local market. The National Apple company, although established but two months, announces it has received orders for 12 carloads, to be shipped in the fall and early winter. In addition to these early demands, the National company has received an order calling for a car of Aristo Reds, but so far as known not a tree of this variety is grown in the valley.

Columbia Farmers Plan Creamery.

Astoria—The Lower Columbia Farmers' Creamery company has decided to erect and operate a co-operative creamery in this city. The stockholders met and organized by the election of John Onkka as president; Mat Matson as vice president, and C. S. Dow as secretary and treasurer. The company has purchased a tract 50x100 feet at the corner of Ninth and Duane streets for \$5500, and will erect a two-story reinforced concrete building.

Dairy Exhibit is Blocked.

Salem—That the state dairy and food commissioner cannot maintain a dairy exhibit at the state fair, the expenses of the same to come from the state dairy and food commission fund, is the substance of an opinion which was furnished by Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle.
