Prof. J. M. Glass of California, will speak in the M. E. church this evening on the subject of Woman's Suffrage. Everybody interested one way or another is invited to attend.

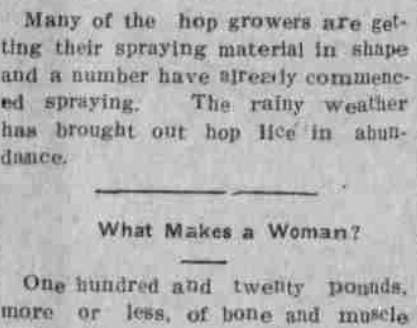
Many of the hop growers are getting their spraying material in shape and a number have already commenced spraying. The rainy weather has brought out hop lice in abundance.

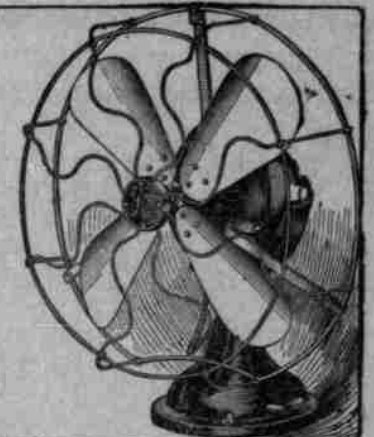
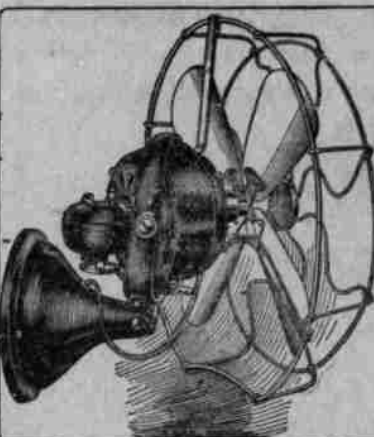
