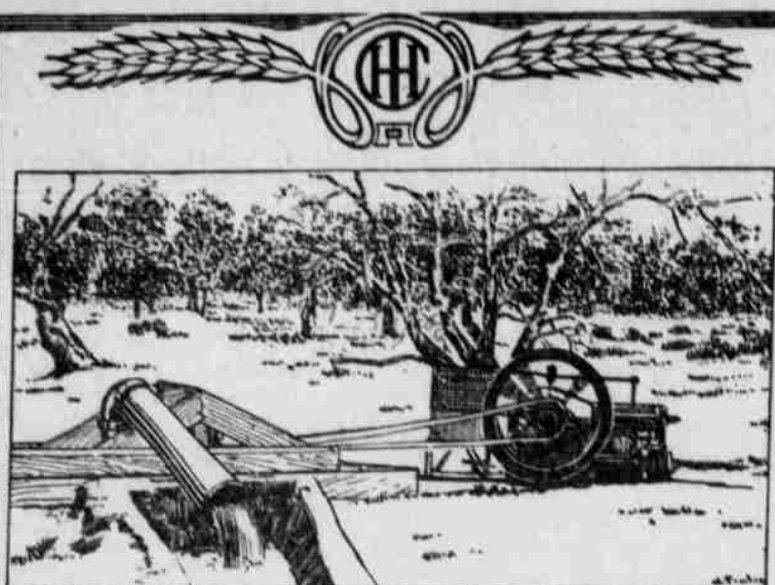

Noed Gardener Writes to the Enterprise of His Trip to Coast.

Editor Enterprise:—My friends in Independence requested me to write them and let them all know what sort of a resort Ocean View is. Knowing they all read the Enterprise I will note a few items which may be of interest to those who intend making a visit to the coast.

The trip from Independence to Ocean View is fine. The first day we camped at Mary's Peak; the second day crossed over Lobster mountain and pitched tent for the night, and the third day reached camp at the great city of Ocean View.

In my opinion this is the best resort for all kinds of sport on the Oregon coast. The mountains are full of deer and bear. Game season is on and men are going out every day and returning with all they can pack in on horses. There is no limit to the fish in this part of the country. People take out from 500 to 1000 every day, and clams—don't mention it—they are so thick that you can't go on the beach without walking on them. Crabs and barrels of crabs, and everything that lives in water is to be found here. Agates and moonstones are unearthed here every day, but I haven't found any onions that beat Bascues'.

Ocean View is 12 miles south of Walport. Has a population of 500 people at present. Has two merchandise stores, two hotels; one feed and livery barn, good public school six months in the year and Sunday school every week.

Dr. Dunsmore and K. C. Eldridge came in today on the stage. They are having a fine time.

I cannot tell at this time when we will return. We are enjoying ourselves, to say the least.

Rev. F. N. Sandifur Gives Description of His Favorite Summer Resort.

Rev. Sandifur writes as follows: "I shall be home on Friday next and will occupy my pulpit next Sunday morning and evening. By that time will have had a good vacation, and hope to return with enlarged vision of opportunity and with new inspiration. Bay View is to my mind an ideal place to beach. We have the life saving station, excellent moun-

tain water piped to our very door, a splendid view of the Pacific ocean in front of us and a grand bit of mountain scenery in the background. To our left we see Tillamook Bay, Bay Ocean, and Cape Mearns light-house.

The P. R. & N. Railroad has a station within 150 feet of our camp, with four trains daily, and Tillamook Bay about one and a half miles distant, affords clam digging and crab fishing; and streams tributary to the Bay afford trout fishing. On Tuesday and Thursday the life savers drill which is always interesting to see, particularly the drill on Thursdays, when they go out in the surf with the life boats.

We have had good weather most of the time since we came, although it has rained several times at night. Two Sundays there has been preaching at the Pavilion. I had the honor of preaching the first sermon in the Pavilion here, if not the first protestant sermon in this place, at 11 a. m., August 4.

We have spoken to the proper authorities for a lot at Bay View for a pavilion to be used for religious purposes.

Our topic for next Sunday will be: 11 a. m., Lessons from the Sea; at 8 p. m., Vacations, Are They Needed? I shall be pleased to see the good people of Independence again.
